# Rare Abe Lincoln Volume Finally Found; To be Placed at Postville

Search for a rare Lincoln book ended Thursday when John Davis, of Lincoln, presented an SG-page volume to E. H. Luken-bill, who accepted the book on belief of the Loren Courty Heads. half of the Logan County Hisotri-nal Society. The book will be placed on display in the historcal room at Postville Courthouse

"The Life, Speeches and Public Services of Abraham Lincoln," published in 1865, the same year as Lincoln's assassination, had been sought by Lukenbill for some time. He had planned to visit Mason City in the near future in an effect to locate a copy.

The illustrated Lincoln work is by J. H. Barrett, published by Moore, Wilstach and Baldwin, of New York and Cincinnati. A preface to the book states that reading material contains "early history, political career, and speeches of Abraham Lincoln in and out of Congress, also a general view of his policy as president, with his messages, proclamations and letters, and a history of his eventful administration and scenes attodant upon his tragic and lamented demise." # Tips for Safer Winter Driving

Car manufacturers have made many contributions to safe winter driving, according to the Illinois Division of Traffic Safety, but three of the most important aids are not included as either stand-

erd or optional equipment.

The first is a bucket or box of sand or cinders with a little salt mixed in it. The second is a shovel to scatter the sand and to Gig ice and snow away from the wheels. With these two a driver can get out of many a slick spot. The weight of the sand box helps hold the rear end of the car steady, too.

The third is an alarm clock and

it is the most important of the three. By setting it a littler ear-lier, drivers get more time - vital time in winter driving - time to warm up the engine good before we start; time to clean the car windshield, side and rear win-downs and headlight lenses; and time to drive at a much easier pace than usual. In all the safe driving tricks for winter driving, none is quite so effective as "tak-ing our time."
