

## Rare Abe Lincoln Volume Finally Found; To be Placed at Postville

Search for a rare Lincoln book ended Thursday when John Davis, of Lincoln, presented an 842-page volume to E. H. Lukenbill, who accepted the book on behalf of the Logan County Historical Society. The book will be placed on display in the historical room at Postville Courthouse.

"The Life, Speeches and Public Services of Abraham Lincoln," published in 1865, the same year as Lincoln's assassination, had been sought by Lukenbill for some time. He had planned to visit Mason City in the near future in an effort to locate a copy.

The illustrated Lincoln work is by J. H. Barrett, published by Moore, Wilstach and Baldwin, of New York and Cincinnati. A preface to the book states that reading material contains "early history, political career, and speeches of Abraham Lincoln in and out of Congress, also a general view of his policy as president, with his messages, proclamations and letters, and a history of his eventful administration and scenes attendant upon his tragic and lamented demise."

### Hunting History

Lukenbill is also looking for an 1886 history of Logan county to be placed in the Postville museum. Several local residents have copies of this history, and the historical society would appreciate a loan or donation.

Articles having a direct connection with Logan county historical events or Lincoln will be accepted for display by the historical society.

## Milton, Wis. Bank Robbed

MILTON, Wis. (AP) — A patient, diminutive gunman who parked his car outside the Bank of Milton this morning and waited for the first official to arrive took some \$17,000 from the bank's vault and escaped.

A general Midwest alarm was broadcast by authorities for the gunman, described by Asst. Cashier John Misener as 5 feet 2 inches tall and about 24 years old.

Misener said the young man had parked a late model blue-green or gray-green Pontiac sedan at the curb in front of the bank. When Misener arrived to open the bank, the young man approached him, drew the gun and ordered the official to open the bank.

The money was taken from a money chest in the bank vault.

"It was protected by a time lock," Cashier Phil Hudson said, "but the lock had run out at 7 o'clock. The holdup man apparently was that familiar with vault operations."

## 17 Billions to Be AF Asking

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Times said today that informed sources had disclosed that President Eisenhower will ask Congress for \$17,800,000,000 for the Air Force for the next fiscal year.

A Washington dispatch to the Times noted that this figure is \$2,400,000,000 higher than the President asked a year ago for the current fiscal year and about a billion dollars more than the sent Congress in August.

It also was reported in Washington that Eisenhower will seek \$11,200,000,000 for the Navy, 10 billion for the Army and 200 million for Defense Department expenses. All this would result in a total military budget request of \$39,200,000,000.

This would be \$4,100,000,000 more than the President originally requested for defense-spending authority for the current fiscal

## Protesting U.S. Decision

BUDAPEST (AP)—Soviet-supported Premier Janos Kadar has protested to a U. N. relief mission against the United States' decision not to grant loans or economic aid to the Hungarian government so long as it is headed by Kadar or anybody else regarded in the West as a Russian puppet.

The disclosure was made by Budapest radio following the visit of the U.N. inspection mission headed by Philippe de Seynes, a U. N. undersecretary.

De Seynes left Vienna by plane Tuesday night to return to New York. A member of the group said speedy delivery of coal on a large scale is the only way to end Hungary's present economic chaos, and the West must decide whether it wants to send food and clothing to the Hungarians indefinitely or support Kadar's government with the raw materials Hungarian industry needs to get back on its feet.

Although the Hungarian government claimed that more coal miners were reporting to the pits, it admitted that production was still lagging.

## Backwash Shows in Preliminaries

The backwash of the Orville E. Hodge 10th session of the Illinois General Assembly opened Wednesday.

A perfunctory session today, then adjourned until next week, when it will hear Gov. Stratton's program.

A joint Senate-House committee to investigate lobbying activities, with particular reference connected with the affairs of Hodge, also asked in a bill for registration reports on their spending.

Russell Arrington (R-Evanston) grew out of a \$35,000 lobbying fee paid by Union Electric Co. of Missouri to obtain passage of a favorable bill at the Legislature's 1935 session. Lynch and Arrington sponsored the 1935 bill.

**For Protection**

They said a full investigation of the lobbying transaction was needed "to protect the integrity of the General Assembly."

Their resolution said five senators and five representatives would be appointed to consider the nature and scope of organized lobbying activities in the Assembly.

The lobbying fee involving Union Electric was paid to obtain passage of legislation enabling the firm to save \$36,000 annually in Illinois franchise taxes. State investigators have said four checks ended up in Hodge's secret envelope account at the Southmoor Bank and Trust Co. of Chicago.

Edward A. Hintz, a former president of the bank, and Edward A. Epping, a former Hodge office manager, also convicted of conspiracy in the Hodge case, were called before the grand jury Wednesday, when the Legislature was being organized.

Another of the first measures to hit the Senate was a \$369,259 deficiency appropriation requested by state Auditor Lloyd Morey to keep his office operating until June 30, when new funds become available. Another bill sought by Morey called for transfer of surplus funds in some office accounts to exhausted accounts.

Administration leaders said they have put off a 36½ million dollar deficiency bill for public aid programs until Monday to permit full scale hearings in the House Jan. 28 before a vote the following day.

Other bills introduced called for:

Giving Southern Illinois University \$395,000 for operations during the next six months, and permitting engineering courses there.

Lowering the voting age from 21 to 18 through an amendment to the state Constitution.

## CHANGED

The traffic light warning system that indicates the approach of emergency vehicles has been changed slightly here, Police Chief Earl Minder said today.

Police cars and fire trucks are equipped so they can control the traffic lights ahead of them. The equipment turns the lights at a given intersection red after a three-second warning period. Now the lights will remain red until the control is released.

Before one light would flash amber if two emergency cars were approaching the same intersection at the same time.

## Dr. West, Once Lincoln Resident, Dies in N. York

Dr. Theodore S. West, 71, former Lincoln resident and a radiologist who supervised physical examinations of the scientific personnel of the Manhattan (atomic bomb) Project, died of cancer Jan. 4 at United Hospital in Port Chester, N. Y.

Dr. West attended grade school in Lincoln and was graduated from Lincoln High School. He was well-known here. He retired last October after 38 years as director of roentgenology at Port Chester's United Hospital and had since been director emeritus.

While at the Manhattan Project, he was kept in ignorance of the purpose of his examinations of the scientist-patients who visited him late in World War II. He made the tests at the Army Medical Corps' general dispensary in New York where he was a lieutenant colonel.

### OF MEDICAL FAMILY

A graduate in 1918 of Albany, N. Y., Medical College, Dr. West came from a long line of physicians. His maternal grandfather, Dr. John Allen, was a Civil War contract surgeon. His father, Dr. William D. West, became a physician after serving as a private in the Civil War. His six brothers, including Dr. Harold C. West of Yonkers, N. Y., who survives, were medical doctors.

As a captain in World War I, Dr. West trained other Medical Corps personnel in radiology. He joined the staff of the United Hospital after World War I and in 1934 received the diploma of the American Board of Radiology. Developed X-ray

Dr. West originated and developed the X-ray treatment for shingles and in 1932 discussed the subject in papers read before the International and Inter-American Congress of Radiology.

He was a fellow of the American College of Radiology, past chairman of the Westchester County Medical Society, and a member of the American Roentgen Ray Society and of the New York Roentgen Society.

His widow, Mrs. Dorothea Arndt West, also survives.

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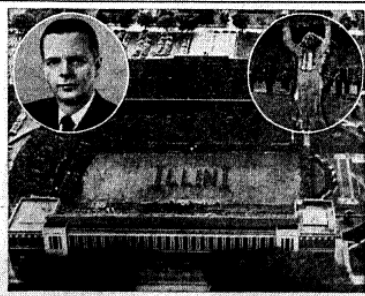

However, temperatures in the upper Great Lakes were around zero, the same as in the northern and central Rockies and in the northern plateau region.

Snow flurries fell over the Great Lakes region and eastward to the Appalachians during the night.

Heaviest falls were reported in upper Michigan and at Buffalo, N. Y., which reported two inches, making a total of more than 17 inches on the ground.

Clear skies and dry weather prevailed in most other sections of the country. Warmest area was Southern California.

## Tips for Safer Winter Driving

Car manufacturers have made many contributions to safe winter driving, according to the Illinois Division of Traffic Safety, but three of the most important aids are not included as either standard or optional equipment.

The first is a bucket or box of sand or cinders with a little salt mixed in it. The second is a shovel to scatter the sand and to dig ice and snow away from the wheels. With these two a driver can get out of many a slick spot. The weight of the sand box helps hold the rear end of the car steady, too.

The third is an alarm clock and it is the most important of the three. By setting it a little earlier, drivers get more time — vital time in winter driving — time to warm up the engine good before we start; time to clean the car windshield, side and rear windows and headlight lenses; and time to drive at a much easier pace than usual. In all the safe driving tricks for winter driving, none is quite so effective as "taking our time."

Higgins also said that this year the program is being operated under a definite allocation of funds and consideration will be given to farmers desiring to execute agreements on a first-come-first-served basis. Taking part in the Acreage Reserve program is entirely voluntary.

Producers on farms for which an "old farm" corn acreage allotment has been established are eligible to participate. The maximum acreage which may be placed in the reserve at this time is 20 acres or 30 per cent of the allotment, whichever is the larger. If the farmer is interested in placing a larger acreage in the reserve, he should indicate this on the original agreement. The additional acreage will be accepted and a new agreement signed if funds are available after the program sign-up has closed.

The deceased graduated from Atlanta high school in 1930. He was a member of the Atlanta Christian church and the Masonic Lodge and Eastern Star at Placerville.

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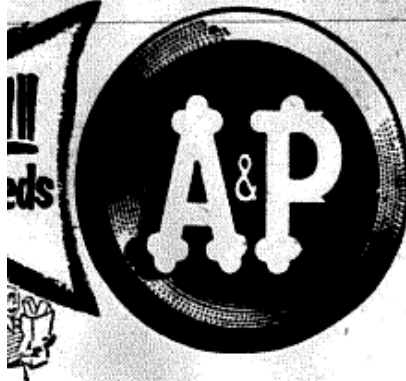

## Penal Farm "Overflows"

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (U. S. — Warden Glen Murphy of the state penal farm at Vandalia said Monday the minimum security institution is jammed beyond capacity with prisoners and "if we get any more I don't know what we'll do."

He urged county sheriffs to "hold short-term prisoners in your jails rather than send them to us."

Murphy told the Illinois Sheriffs Assn. that the Vandalia farm has 1,620 inmates—500 to 600 over capacity.

"The dormitories are so crowded we can't walk through them unless some of the men are in bed," he said.

Overcrowding at Vandalia stems from a new law permitting narcotic addicts to be sent there, he said. The sheriffs should support an effort to amend the new law "so that the state will have to do something else with this kind of inmate," Murphy added.

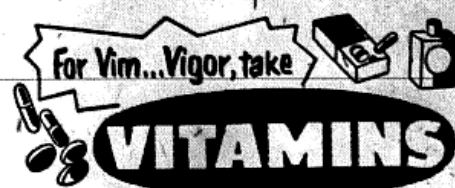
