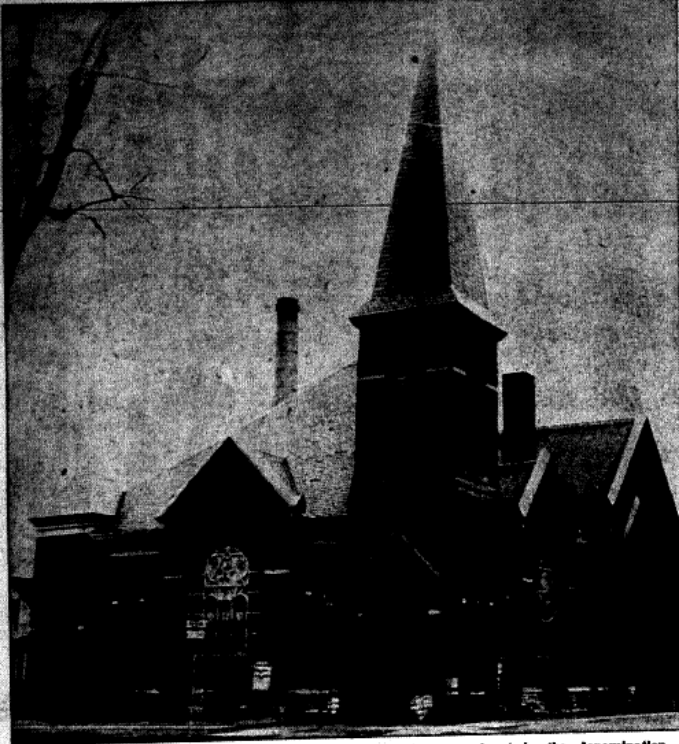
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## CHURCH CENTENNIAL STARTING SUNDAY

### Hunt New Clues In Chicago Case

CHICAGO (U) — Police were back in the neighborhood of the slain Grimes sisters today seeking clues in their deaths as the mystery of how they died appeared no nearer solution.

As police renewed their search of the area where Barbara Grimes, 15, and Patricia, 13, lived, the confession of Edward (Bennie) Bedwell, held for their slayings, appeared to be breaking down.

Bedwell, 21-year-old illiterate skid row drifter, has repudiated a signed statement in which he said he and a companion killed the girls. He said sheriff's police beat and kicked him into admitting he and a man named Frank killed the girls on Jan. 13.

However, medical evidence and statements of Bedwell's acquaintances have supported his contention that the confession was a lie.

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# D: vn Coming A.F.L. - C.I.O.

AFL-CIO Besides adopting strict new rules forbidding shady and dishonest union practices, the council Tuesday cracked down on three unions—the Laundry, Distillery and Allied Industrial Workers.

It ordered suspension and eventual expulsion of the unions within 90 days unless they toss out certain officers and adopt decency standards.

The three unions contend the council acted without evidence to hold them guilty of being "dominated, controlled and substantially influenced by corrupt influences."

**Pledged by Meany**  
However, AFL-CIO President George Meany said the unions knew the nature of the purges they had to conduct to avoid AFL-CIO ousters.

Meany pledged that unless they fully complied with cleanup requirements, the unions would be booted out of the federation.

All three unions had been charged in a 1955 Senate investigation with welfare funds scandals.

Eisenhower added that if he were to select a practicing attorney without court experience, the man would have to have an exceptional background such as did the late John W. Davis and Ellihu Root, noted constitutional lawyers.

Eisenhower said he wanted to emphasize again that political considerations would not enter into the picking of a new justice.

Europe — Discussing Western Europe's need for oil from this country and elsewhere because of reduced supplies from the Middle East, Eisenhower said the United States cannot afford to have Europe flat on its back.

**Britain An Example**

That was in response to a reporter's remark that European nations apparently are not getting adequate oil deliveries from this country. The newsman said Britain, for example, reportedly is down to a two weeks supply.

Asked whether as President he could do anything about the situation, Eisenhower replied that he probably has certain powers to step into that situation. But he added the government should not disturb the economy of the country except when it has to.

Middle East — Eisenhower said his conferences with King Saud of Saudi Arabia have helped to clear away what he called the underbrush of misunderstanding, and also have helped in the struggle toward an enduring peace.

In response to a question, Eisenhower said Saud has given him assurances of friendship and understanding of the American position regarding the danger of any Communist aggression in the Mid-East.

**Asks His Feelings**

Mrs. Wilson — A reporter recalled what he termed Mrs. Charles E. Wilson's "mild rebuke" of Eisenhower because the President had not backed up Secretary of Defense Wilson in the ruckus over Wilson's remarks about the National Guard. The reporter asked how Eisenhower felt about that.

Eisenhower replied with a smile that he was too old a campaigner to be bothered by that sort of thing.

Mrs. Wilson's ire was aroused when the President, at a news conference last week, said it was "unwise" for Wilson to have said there was a "draft dodging business" in National Guard enlistments during the Korean War.

**Gives No Sign**

National Guard — Eisenhower gave no indication that he is planning any basic modification of a new Pentagon program which would require National Guard enlistees to put in six months of active duty. The National Guard

viet attack was about to take place.

Apparently startled by the question, Eisenhower remarked, oh, for goodness sake. Then he went on to say that anything is possible in this world. But he said he believes the possibility of super weapons being used grows less each year. It was then he added that any such use would amount to just another way of committing suicide.

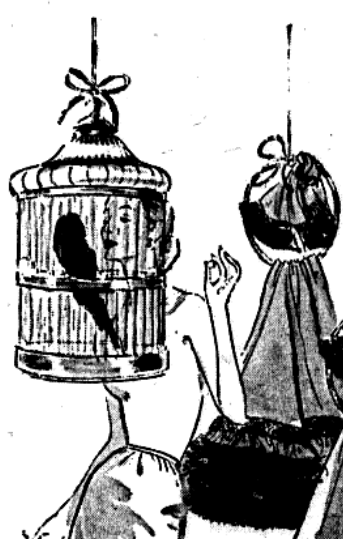

### "ON THE MAP"

Postville will soon be "on the map" of historic Lincoln shrines published by the state of Illinois. A folder is being published by the state describing Postville to tourists, who will include Lincoln on their tour of the Lincoln trial, along with Springfield, New Salem and other shrines.

Among the many interesting items to be displayed at Postville will be early histories of Logan county. The old volumes include Judge Lawrence Stringer's book; the 1886 history, donated by Mrs. Dean Hill; a biographical history donated by Mrs. Kenneth Patterson. Still missing from the historical collection is the history of 1874, however.

Other articles include the original circuit clerk's desk, now in Springfield and owned by Mrs. Edward Malerich; an oak drop-leaf table which was owned by the Lincoln family, to be given by Ethel Welch of Lincoln; a dining room chair in which Lincoln sat, from Samuel Hoblit of Atlanta; and a rocker which was one of Lincoln's favorites when he visited the Latham home, which stood in Lincoln on the present site of the Kerpan apartments.

### GET MAP, FLAG

There will also be on display a large early map donated by Lynn Parker and family; a flag carried in one of Lincoln's campaign parades, given by Claude U. Stone, former county school superintendent at Peoria and later a member of congress and editor of the Peoria Star; and a city of Lincoln 1953 souvenir plate.

Logan County School Supt. E. H. Lukenbill, active in the Historical Society, has a voluminous scrapbook of Lincoln material which will also be placed in the Postville museum, along with a picture of Lincoln now hanging in Lukenbill's office.

The picture, an official photo, is a reproduction of one of four profile views of the President, and was given to Lukenbill by a

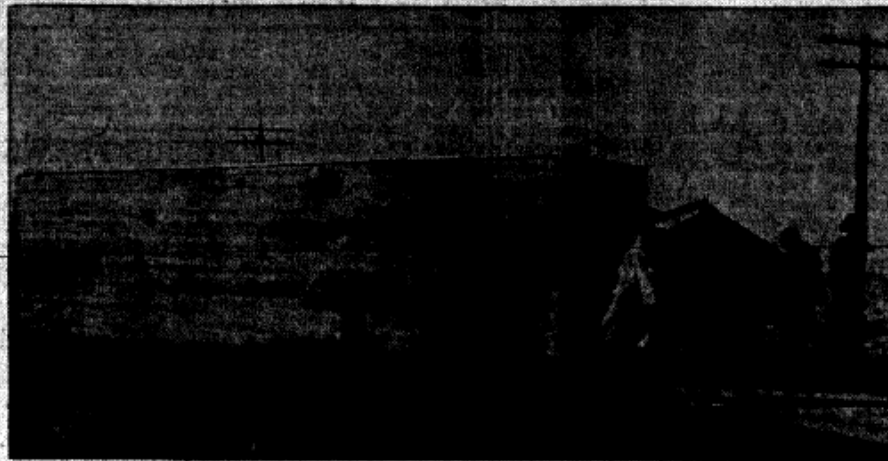

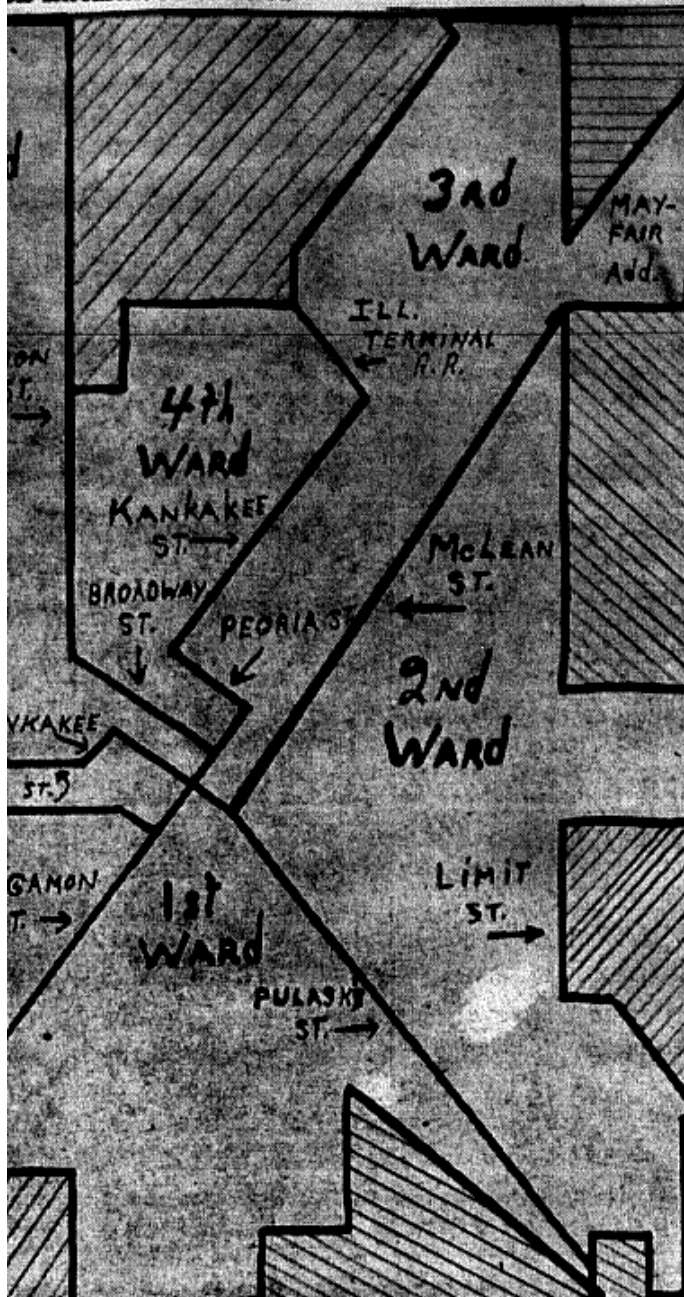

## Hunting for 13 Missing

SEOUL (AP) — Search crews today found four more bodies in the twisted wreckage of a U.S. Air Force Globemaster that crashed and burned Friday night on a Han River sandbar. This raised the list of known dead to 9, leaving 13 others still missing and presumed dead.

The big C124 transport was enroute to Japan with 159 Americans aboard — 10 Air Force crewmen, 147 Army men and 2 Army civilian employees. Most were on leave. Twenty-eight of the 137 survivors accounted for are still hospitalized, two of them in serious condition.

A spokesman for a 10-man Air Force investigation team said three of the bodies just recovered were those of Army personnel and the other was a crewman. They were taken to the mortuary section of the 121st Evacuation Hospital at Ascom City for positive identification.

Army and Air Force officials said the search was continuing for the missing.

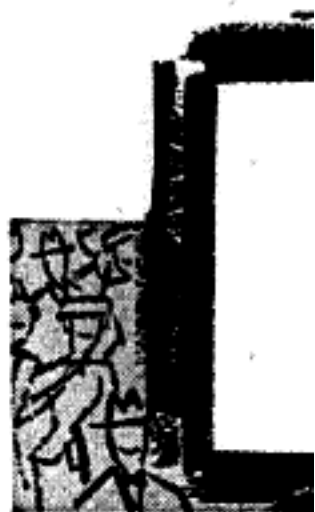

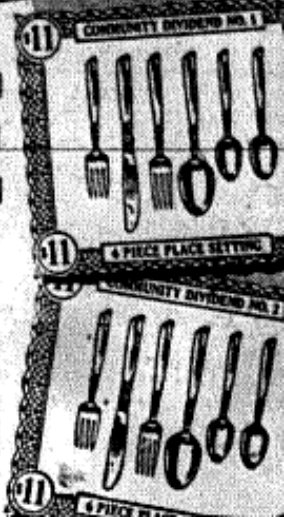

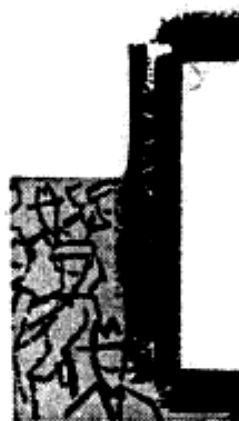

## DENIES GUILT:

### 3 to 5-Year Sentence For Sam Perroni Here

Judge Frank S. Bevan passed sentence of three to five years in the Illinois state penitentiary for Samuel Glenn Perroni, 40, of Springfield, Wednesday afternoon after overruling a motion for a new trial.

Perroni was convicted by a jury in Logan county circuit court during January on charges of burglary and larceny of Frank's Food Fair in Lincoln. Jurors returned a verdict of guilty to all three charges of an indictment against Perroni, and assessed the value of property taken at \$2,262.50.

Before passing sentence, Judge Bevan conducted an aggravation and mitigation hearing. Perroni and his court-appointed attorney, Daniel W. Handlin said they had no further evidence to submit in mitigation, but Perroni himself made the longest statement in his many court appearances.

"I Am Innocent"

"I am an innocent man, convicted of a crime I did not commit," he said. The defendant added that he was willing for the court to pass sentence so that an appeal could be filed.

State's Attorney Darrell Klink offered in evidence a transcript of a previous criminal proceeding against Perroni from Escambia county, Fla., and recommended a minimum penitentiary sentence of eight years. The criminal record was entered over objections by Handlin.

After sentence was pronounced, the defense attorney, who has

served the entire case without pay, made an oral motion for a stay of sentence. Judge Bevan allowed Handlin three days on which to prepare a written motion.

The judge overruled previous defense motions asking for a new trial, a judgment of not guilty notwithstanding the jury verdict, and an arrest of judgment.

### Landing Gear Locks, Holds 26 Aboard Plane Prisoners

DETROIT (U) — Twenty-six persons were trapped in the sky for six hours before one final effort locked a balky landing gear in place and allowed a Capital Airlines Constellation to glide in at dusk Wednesday for a safe landing.

The four-engine plane's five-man crew used water, coffee and milk to build up hydraulic pressure to force the Constellation's nose wheel into place for the landing.

After the landing, the crew and 21 passengers alighted smiling and thankful.

The passengers appeared unaware that their plight had prompted emergency crash rescue operations at Milwaukee and Detroit airports during the five hours the plane flew from Gen. Mitchell Field to Willow Run to burn up gasoline.

The plane was Flight 930 from Minneapolis to Philadelphia, via Detroit and Milwaukee. It touched down at 6:05 p.m. and immediately was impounded by civil aeronautics officials for a complete inspection.

Llamed on Airlock  
Capt. William Richie, 38, of Minneapolis, the plane's pilot, said he knew the landing gear had an air lock moments after takeoff from Milwaukee when he tried to raise the nose wheel.

He immediately radioed for aid and a special Viscount carrying hydraulic engineers from Capital's Washington headquarters was rushed to within radio communication. The landing gear was repaired while engineers gave instructions to the crew over Lake Erie.

CHICAGO (U) — A teenage girl who was a palbearer at the funeral of the slain sisters says she once saw a picture in the billfold of one girl which resembled a man charged with their murder.

But police Wednesday said they doubt the picture seen by Dolores Castillo, 15 was of Edward Lee (Bennie) Bedwell, 21, is free \$20,000 bond on charges of murdering Barbara Grimes, 15, and her sister, Patricia, 13.

The charges against Bedwell are based on a controversial confession he made, and then recanted. In it, he said he and an accomplice killed the sisters after a week-long sex and liquor binge and dumped their bodies at a lonely suburban roadside.

Had Gone to Show

The bodies, stripped and frozen, were found Jan. 22 beside a road southwest of the city. The girls had been missing since Dec. 28, when they left home to attend a neighborhood movie.

Dolores, who shared a locker with Barbara at Kelly High School, said that in September 1935 she saw a photograph resembling Bedwell in Barbara's billfold. She said Barbara described the boy pictured as her boy friend.

She (Barbara) mentioned him from time to time and told of having dates with him, Dolores recalled for police. She said she liked him very much, and was crazy about him. I noticed he had long sideburns, a gabardine jacket and slacks, and a shirt open at the neck.

Police said Dolores based her identification on newspaper photographs she had seen of Bed-

Stupka told the group that opening of the St. Lawrence seaway will make Chicago one of the major seaports of the world and will open the way to unprecedented industrial expansion along Illinois' inland waterways. He said that the seaway will be able to handle 75 per cent of all the traffic of all the seaports in the United States. He pointed out that other Great Lakes ports such as Milwaukee, Duluth, Cleveland and Detroit are seeking the business and that competition is keen.

## Outlook Viewed

The Illinois Division of Industrial Planning and Development predicts that within the next five years, one out of every three industries outside of the midwest which gross over a million dollars a year will build a factory or warehousing outfit in the area that is within 250 miles of Chicago's seaport.

"We can get many of these industries to locate in Illinois if we show them the many advantages that we offer," Stupka reported. For instance, Illinois' tax structure is the most favorable in the midwest and ranks second in the nation, he pointed out.

"Operation Pin-Point" will begin as soon as 24 communities in the state participate, it was explained. Several cities are already committed to the program.

Representatives of Bloomington, Normal, Lincoln, Pontiac, Chenoa, Lexington, Clinton, Gibson City, El Paso, Eureka, Delavan, Fairbury and Minonk participated in the discussion which followed.
