Broadwell Woman, Daughter 10, **Cliff Benner Sees** Auto-Truck Crash Killing Wife, Girl

Logan county's eighth and ninth traffic deaths of the year were recorded Sunday night when Mrs. Dorothy J. Benner, 43, Broadwell, and her 10-year-old daughter, Kay Frances, died from injuries suffered in a car-truck carsh at Broadwell on route 66.

Last year at this time three traffic deaths had been rerded in the county.

Mrs. Benner apparently drove her car into the path of a truck driven by Fredrick O. Seablom, 22. Schiller Park.

She was headed west across the highway and the truck was headed south. Mrs. Benner's husband, Clifford Benner, mayor of Broadwell, was standing in a gasoline station driveway nearby and saw the accident.

He ran to the scene and found ns wife lying on the pavement. He didn't know his car was involved until he got to the scene. She died at Lincoln Memorial hospital at 9:35 p.m., a few minutes more than an hour after the accident.

SKULL FRACTURED

The girl was dead on arrival at the hospital. Mrs. Benner suffered a skull fracture. The girl was trapped in the car and ap-mently died of internal injuries. A dog that was riding in the car also was killed. The truck driver

was not injured. Impact of the crash knocked the car about 100 feet and the truck jack-knifed and went off the road. The trailer overturned. State Policemen Robert Wer-





4. The United States considers "that controls and reduction of arms are possible, desirable, and, in the last reckoning, indispensa-ble," the atomic arms race "is costly, sterile and dangerous" and "we shall not cease our striving to bring it to a dependable end."

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5. History suggest that "a conflict as basic as that dividing the world of freedom and the world of international communism ultimately erupts in war" but the United States rejects the notion that war is inevitable and be-lieves that it can be prevented.

Dulles refrained from any di-rect detailed discussion of the long crisis in the Middle East revolving around Israeli-Arab hostility and the Suez Canal dispute.

In general, he said this country is "striving to bring about conditions in the Middle East better than those provocative and dangerous conditions out of which the recent violence was born."

This will take time, he said, because emotions run high in the area and also because "such situations, ... are always worsened by Soviet intrigue."

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




