600 Combat Blaze in Empty Storage Building

CHICAGO (AP) — Some 600 firemen finally stamped out a spectacular extra-alarm blaze in an unused cold storage building after a 12-hour battle Wednesday.

The fire in the seven-story building drew thousands of spectators in shivering, near 10 degree weather. Forty-one fire fighting units, including two fire boats and two towers, fought the fire on the northern edge of the Loop across the Chicago River.

Two firemen were slightly injured. There was no estimate of damage.

Fire Commissioner Robert J. Quinn said the blaze apparently was touched off some vagrant who started the fire to warm himself.

Firemen said there have been several other but smaller fires in the building in recent years, similarly started by vagrants seeking a place to sleep. The building has not been used in years.

Use Big Crane

Firefighters had difficulty extinguishing fire smoldering in a 12 to 18 inch cork lining inside the brick exterior walls. A huge crane was brought to smash through the 22-inch-thick brick wall.

Huge columns of smoke which poured from the building at times forced firemen to retreat. The smoke and flames which leaped into the sky quickly attracted spectators to the area.

Store Destroyed

DECATUR, Ill. (AP) — This city's fire department Wednesday battled a blaze that destroyed the Morehouse and Wells Co., store in the downtown area.

Robert C. Humphrey, president of the appliance and sporting goods retail firm, estimated damage at "several hundred thousand dollars."

Temperatures of 10 degrees above zero and heavy smoke hampered firemen. They said the fire apparently burned several hours before being discovered. The cause was not immediately determined.

Humphrey said the exact loss would not be determined for some time. The company sold goods on two floors and in the basement.

CHAPEL BURNS

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The Elizabeth Holloway Woods Memorial Chapel of the Webster Groves Presbyterian church, one of the largest in the St. Louis area, was destroyed by fire Wednesday.

Church officials estimated damage between \$400,000 and \$500,000.

The church's three-story education building separated from the chapel by a thick stone wall was not damaged, nor was the sanctuary east of the chapel, which was built of stone.

Flames burst through the roof of the chapel 45 minutes after the first alarm and an hour later the roof collapsed. Fire equipment from suburban Rock Hill, Clayton, Kirkwood and Webster Groves battled the blaze.

The 150-seat chapel contained the Sunday school office, an organ and tower chimes and the study of the pastor, the Rev. Dr. Reuben F. Pieters. The church has a membership of 3,300.

HE SWEARS OFF

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. (AP) — Five persons suffered minor burns and cuts when an explosion caused by a leaking gas pipe demolished a small bar here.

"Are you hurt?" Det. T. J. Despain asked one of the patrons who staggered out of the wreckage. "No, but I'll never drink beer in there again," he answered.

FIRE KILLS CHILD

BLACKWELL, Okla. (AP) — Mrs. Omer Cottle spent much of New Year's Eve visiting her husband at Blackwell General Hospital, where he has been confined since October with injuries received in an oil well fire.

While her mother was gone, 8-year-old Virginia Cottle apparently got too close to the flames of an open gas heater at home. Her 11-year-old brother Alan stopped Virginia as she ran screaming from the house and suffered minor burns smothering the flames that had engulfed her.

Virginia died at the hospital where her father is confined.

There were 40 more grass fires in 1957 than in 1956.

School Ordered To Pay Man Here

Decatur school district has been ordered by Macon County Circuit Judge Martin E. Morland to pay \$12,353 to Circuit Clerk John W. Curry in a suit brought against the school district in 1933 by Edwin M. Swam, of Swam Electric Service, Decatur.

Swam, now a resident of Lincoln, is owner of Lincoln Electric Co. He brought court action alleging \$19,354 was due for electrical work at the Grant, Oak Grove and Harris grade schools at Decatur.

The school district acknowledged responsibility only for the \$12,353. The court order instructs this amount to be held by the Macon county circuit clerk until further orders are entered for distribution of the sum.

Since the suit was filed by Swam, other parties, including a Peoria electric firm, an insurance company and attorneys, have filed claims to portions of the money. The court order releases the school district upon the circuit clerk's receipt of the \$12,353.

Slain in Preacher's Study

ROCK RAPIDS, Ia. (U.S. — Mrs. Carol Hoskins, 22, of Rock Rapids, who had taken her baby to church to be baptized Sunday, was slain in the pastor's study.

Authorities are seeking her estranged husband, Jack Hoskins, 30, of Lamoni, Ia.

Sheriff Fred Tonne said a car was stolen a few hours after the shooting and that roadblockers have been set up in the vicinity of this northwest Iowa community.

The Rev. Paul Freeman, pastor of the Congregational Church, said Mrs. Hoskins arrived at the church with her 2-month-old baby about 2 p.m. and her husband arrived about 40 minutes later.

The couple had been separated since their return from Sacramento, Calif., in November.

The pastor said Hoskins showed great affection toward the child before the ceremony and that the husband "had tears in his eyes, while the private sacrament was being performed."

Goes From Church
Immediately after the ceremony, the pastor said, Mrs. Hoskins

asked to be allowed to talk in private with her husband in the pastor's study.

The Rev. Mr. Freeman said he then left the church.

Mrs. Hoskins was found wounded on the floor of the pastor's study less than half an hour later by the pastor's son, John, 11.

She had two .32-caliber bullet wounds in the upper part of the body and one in the head.

She died a few hours later at a hospital.

The baby, Paul Frederick, was found on a table in the room, uninjured.

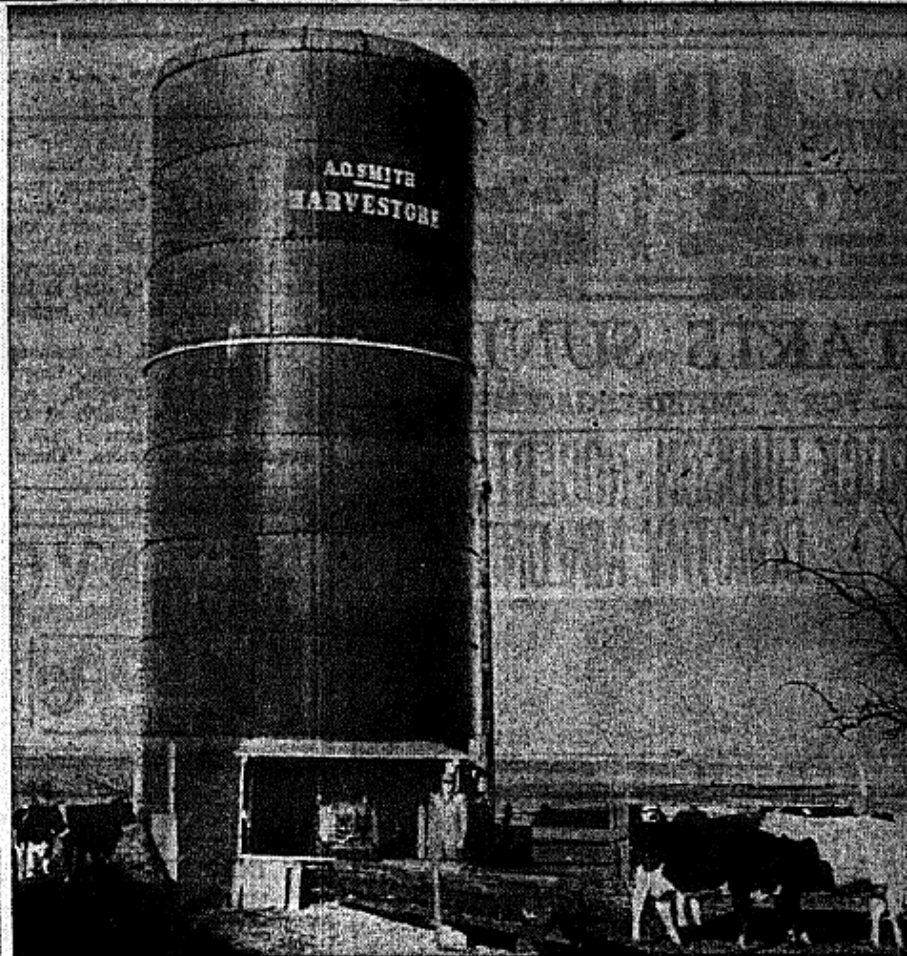

The capital was under heavy guard. Police, troops, armored cars and tanks ringed the presidential palace. Inside the building soldiers patrolled the corridors with automatic rifles.

In the latest shakeup, Perez Jimenez switched Gen. Luis Felipe Llovera Paez from the Interior Ministry he took over last Friday back to his former post as communications minister. The interior job went to Antonio Perez Vivas, ex-governor of the Andean state of Tachira.

Gets Key Post

Gen. Nestor Prato was removed as education minister and given the key post of chief of the general staff.

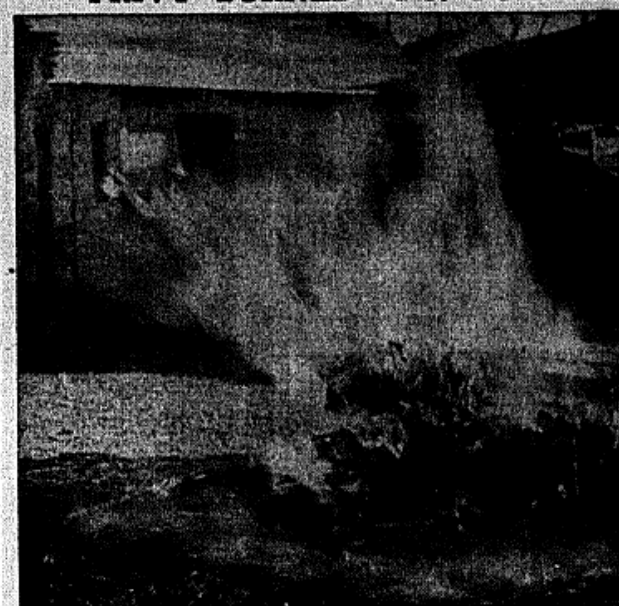

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Lincoln Rural Firemen Kept Busy During 1957

Fifty-four calls, including 12 dwellings, 29 grass fires, three cars and four trucks, kept the Lincoln Rural fire department on the move in 1957.

The fire district also includes Beason and New Holland. Calls at Beason totaled nine during the year and the New Holland volunteers answered seven calls.

The 70 calls in the district resulted in a fire loss for the year of \$37,000. Of the total \$20,000 was in the Beason area and \$10,555 was in the New Holland area.

Fire Chief of the district is Ed Evans who has been with the organization since it was formed in 1939.

District Large

The district includes all of East and West Lincoln, Sheridan and Broadwell townships and parts of Oran and Aetna townships.

The Lincoln rural department's building on 17th street was constructed in 1953.

The district also has fire houses at Beason and New Holland.

At Beason the chief is Jim Wilkie and his group includes 25 volunteers. The Beason group has one fire truck.

23 Volunteer

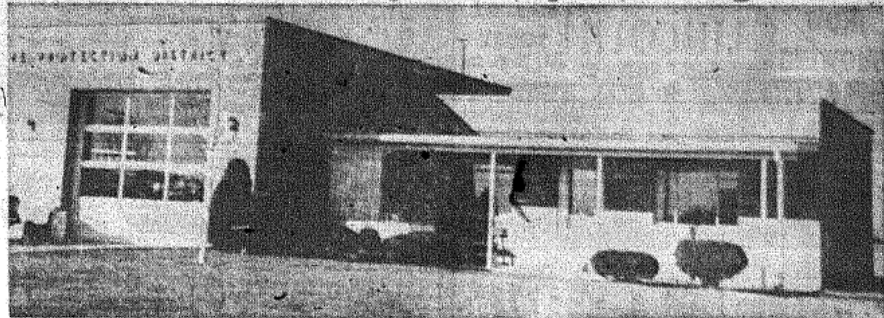
At New Holland the organization includes two trucks and 23 volunteers. Chief is Bert Gutsier. The Lincoln rural department has two trucks with a total capacity of 1,250 gallons of water.

One of the big problems at Beason, where they had four dwelling fires last year, is lack of a water supply source. Chief Evans reports. A 20,000 gallon tank in back of the fire house at Beason is helping to alleviate the problem.

At New Holland the village's water system provides water for fire-fighting purposes.

Await Returns on Vote For Guatemala Offices

GUATEMALA — Candidates of the right and left were leading today in first returns from the presidential election in this one-time Communist beachhead of the Western Hemisphere. But the outcome of Sunday's voting was not expected to be known until late this week.

Provisional President Guillermo Flores Avendano said no matter who won, the danger of Communist influence in Guatemala probably is less than in the United States.

Tentative Figures Given
Unofficial returns from 94 of Guatemala City's 183 polling places gave 18,393 votes to Gen. Miguel Ydigoras Fuentes, 62-year-old veteran right-wing aspirant and 13,811 to Mario Mendez Montenegro, 47, of the leftist Revolutionary Party.

Col. Jose Luis Cruz Salazar, 38-year-old middle-of-the-roader backed by the late President Carlos Castillo Armas' Democratic Nationalist Movement (MDN) had 6,861 votes. Col. Enrique Ardon trailed far behind with 457.

Ydigoras had been expected to

score heavily in the capital, but returns from rural districts could change the trend. Ydigoras carried the city in the Oct. 20 presidential election which was voided after the general's supporters staged bloody riots protesting proclamation of a government candidate as the winner.

Quiet at Polls

Voting Sunday was generally quiet. Flores Avendano warned that the Army stood ready to uphold the decision of Congress, which will make the official canvass of the election returns and choose between the two high men if no candidate gets a majority of the total vote.

The congressional membership now is overwhelmingly MDN. Ydigoras told a news conference if he came out the high man without a majority and Congress chose the second man "against all logic and reason, it will be up to the Army and the people to remedy the situation."

As he had in the last election, Ydigoras charged fraud in some rural districts.

INDIANS WIN:

K.K.K. Leader Indictment To Be Asked in N. Carolina

LUMBERTON, N. C. (AP) — Sheriff Malcolm McLeod says he will ask a grand jury today to indict a Ku Klux Klan leader who had his rally shot out from under him by whooping Indians.

The Robeson County law officer said he wanted charges of inciting to riot brought against the Rev. James Cole of Marion, S.C., self-styled KKK leader of groups in both Carolinas.

Cole, claiming he was denied his rights under the law because he is a member of the white race, said he planned legal action against the sheriff, also a white man.

Turn Other Cheek
But later, Cole said the Klan should turn the other cheek as far as further action may be considered.

"Being Christian is our job and we should turn the other cheek even when offended," he said.

Cole's rally near here Saturday night ended with Klansmen and spectators scrambling for safety as booting Indians emptied rifles, shotguns and pistols into the meeting field.

The Indians were outraged by reports the Klan intended to warn them against race mixing and by the fact that two KKK crosses were burned near Indian homes during the preceding week.

On Private Property

"We were meeting on private property we had leased when these Indians invaded us, shot us up, and stole our equipment," Cole said Sunday night in a telephone interview.

"Now I hear the sheriff wants to indict me and other Klansmen for inciting a riot, but he's not going to do anything about the Indians. I asked for police protection before this started and I was refused."

"I'm being denied my rights because of my race," Sheriff McLeod said "I'm glad it's over. Feelings had been running high. I'm glad we got out without fatalities."

Although Indians poured bullets

for 15 minutes into a field where people milled in pitch darkness, only four men were wounded — none seriously.

Simone Oxendine, son of the mayor of the Indian community of Pembroke, proudly wrapped himself in a captured KKK banner and winked at newsmen.

Oxendine said he had attended a previous Klan meeting in the Lumberton area where Cole stood in the middle of a Negro section and said "some awful things about the Negroes." Said the young Indian:

"The Negroes should have done something about this."

"Won't Be Back"
"I told the boys to take it easy. Slap 'em around a little, if you have to, I told them, but don't hurt 'em. . . . The Klansmen were begging us to let them out of there. They won't come back there'll be blood shed if they do."

There are about 40,000 white people, 30,000 Indians and 25,000 Negroes in Robeson County.

Race relations in Robeson have been generally peaceful. But Indians were aroused last week by the cross burnings. One was in front of the home of an Indian woman who reportedly was dating a white married man. The other was burned in a white neighborhood where an Indian family had occupied a house.

Cars began gathering around the Klan field almost two hours before speeches were due to be

given at 8 p.m. Men with revolvers, shotguns, rifles, and arms, directed each the field.

Light Shot Out
A single bulb lighted a phone. Suddenly an Indian shot the bulb with his rifle. "Start shootin' boys!" a cried.

Gundire crashed. The scattered Sheriff McLeod two deputies hurried tear g.

In about 10 minutes state way patrolmen arrived, cleared the field and the Klan cars through the Indians. There were an estimated 50 Klansmen at the meet

Farm Implement 'Sunshine' View

CHICAGO (AP) — The 1936 outlook in the farm implement industry is clouded by a shifting farm policy, spiraling production costs and that always unpredictable element, weather.

Still, at least two big manufacturers and a majority of the nation's tractor and farm equipment salesmen see a ray of profitable sunshine.

One of the optimistic manufacturers is Deere & Co. Its president, William A. Hewitt, predicts the firm's sales during the coming year will about match the near-record level of 1937. He expressed his views in the firm's annual report.

Report For Year

The company's net sales last year totaled \$388,146,140 — a 24 per cent rise over 1935. The total was second only to Deere's 1931 banner year figure of 397 million dollars.

Hewitt said he based his sales outlook on Department of Agriculture estimates that 1936 cash receipts from farm marketings and government payments will be about the same as the year before.

"This means that each per farm probably will because the number of the United States is expected to decline," a spokesman said.

Another spokesman said that 1935 farm implement sales "should be about the same as last year's." He added that the Harvester predicted to "good moist principal farm areas a prices."

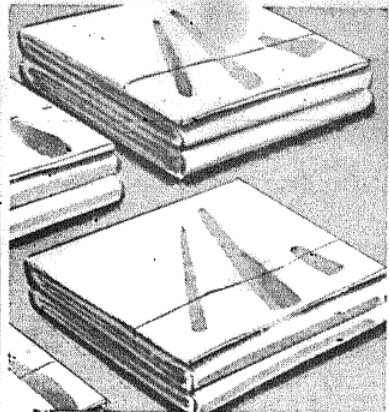

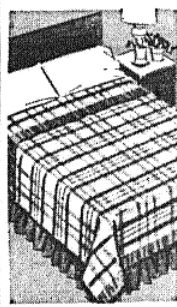

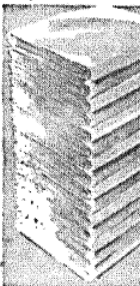

Ike Refuses Secret Data

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower today refused to provide senators studying missile-satellite problems with copies of two top secret reports on proposed improvement of the nation's defense.

Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.), chairman of the special Senate inquiry, made public a White House letter in which the President said:

"After careful consideration of the requests from your and several other committees for the so-called Killian and Gaither panel reports, I have concluded that I cannot properly furnish these reports to the Congress or release them for publication."

Both reports are reported to be sharply critical of the present defense programs and organizations.

Congressman Collapses, Dies

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Lawrence H. Smith, Wisconsin Republican, collapsed and died today. He was 45.

Smith was the fourth member of Congress to die this year.

He collapsed as he entered the House restaurant with a guest and was rushed to Walter Reed Army Hospital, where he was pronounced dead shortly after arrival.

Aides said death was "supposedly of a heart attack." Smith suffered such an attack several years ago.

Reps. Keeney (R-Ill.) and Anderson (R-Minn.) and Sen. Neely (D-W. Va.) have died this year.

Smith's death makes the House lineup now 197 Republicans, 232 Democrats and 6 vacancies.

Kills Wife, Son; Takes Own Life

BEATRICE, Neb. (AP) — A father killed two members of his family today, critically wounded two others, then took his own life. He clubbed his 14-year-old son with a gun butt while the boy was telephoning police for help.

Police Chief Gene R. Burton said Sherman Dean Williams, a shoe repair shop operator here, shot four members of his family with a .32 automatic pistol, then shot himself.

The dead are Williams, his wife, Dorothy, 39, and a son, Richard, 9.

In critical condition with gunshot wounds in the head are Cathy, 6, and Mary Kay, 3. Sherman received head bruises from the gun clubbing while he was on the telephone summoning police to "come quick." Investigators were unable to ascertain immediately what prompted the shootings.

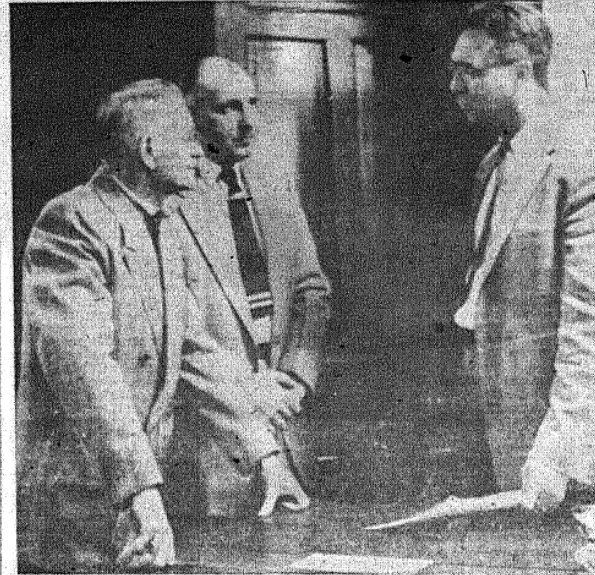

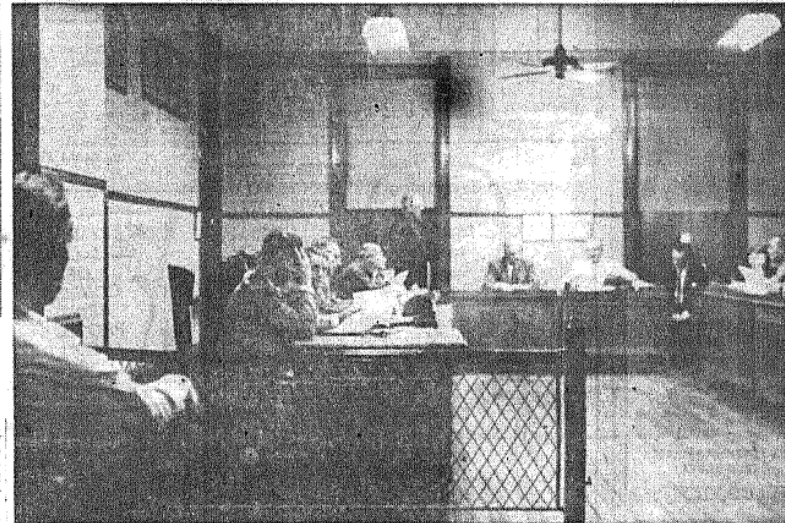

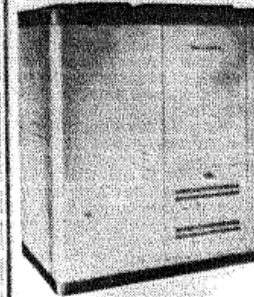

Teamsters Keeping Up Union Alliances

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Jan. 30. — The Teamsters Union, even though expelled by the AFL-CIO as corrupt, is maintaining working alliances with several key AFL-CIO unions.

The Teamsters and three of their old AFL-CIO allies — Operating Engineers, Laborers and Carpenters unions — have just received a three-year-old pact to cooperate in joint activities of workers in highway and other heavy construction jobs.

Now this is going to suit George Meany, AFL-CIO president, and other federation leaders anxious to be seen. It likely will be discussed at the AFL-CIO Executive

Council session opening here Monday, slated in December.

The Teamsters, along with the Laundry and Bakery Workers unions, were ousted from the AFL-CIO in December for alleged corrupt leadership.

The Teamsters have similar mutual aid pacts with several other AFL-CIO unions.

One is the Machinists' Union headed by Al Hayes, chairman of the AFL-CIO Ethical Practices Committee, which paved the way for the Teamsters' ouster from the federation.

The Machinists-Teamsters aid pact is organizing garage employees coming up here, work for removal at a conference between the two unions in Los Angeles.

There is reported to be an argument within the Machinists' Union as to whether to continue their Teamsters alliance. The Machinists and Teamsters have each been putting up \$10,000 a year for joint organizing drives.
