

600 Combat Blaze in **Empty Storage Building**

CHICAGO UP — Some 600 firemen finally stamped out a spectacular extra-alarm blaze in an unused cold storage building after a 12-hour battle Wednesday.

The fire in the seven-story building drew thousands of spectators in shivering, near 10 degree weather. Forty-one fire fighting units, including two fire boats and two towers, fought the fire on the northern edge of the Loop across the Chicago River.

Two firemen were slightly injured. There was no estimate of damage.

Two Iremen were signly in damage. Fire Commissioner Robert J. Quinn said the blaze apparently was touched off some vagrant who started the fire to warm nim-

Firemen said there have been several other but smaller fires in the building in recent years, simi-liarly started by vagrants seek-ing a place to sleep. The building has not been used in years.

Use Big Crane
Firefighters had difficulty extinguishing fire smouldering in a the brick exterior walls. A huge crane was brought to smash through the 22-inch-thick brick

Huge columns of smoke which poured from the building at times torced firemen to retreat. The smoke and flames which leaped into the sky quickly attracted spectators to the area.

Store Destroyed

DECATUR, Ill. th — This city's fire department Wednesday battled a blaze that destroyed the Morehouse and Wells Co., store in the downtown area.

Robert C. Humphrey, president of the appliance and sportings goods retail firm, estimated dam-age at "several hundred thous-sand dollars."

Temperatures of 10 degrees above zero and heavy smoke hampered firemen. They said the fire apparently burned several hours before being discovered. The cause was not immediately

Humphrey said the exact loss would not be determined for some time. The company sold goods on two floors and in the basement.

CHAPEL BURNS

ST. LOUIS AT The Elizabeth Holloway Woods Memorial Chap-el of the Webster Groves Presby-terian church, one of the largest in the St. Louis area, was des-troyed by fire Wednesday.

Church officials estimated damage between \$400,000 and \$300,000.

In 1956 the department had 129 calls with losses estimated at \$16,213.

The calls included 70 grass fires, 25 rubbish and litter fires, 10 car fires, 22 calls to dwellings, two calls to stores and six shed fires.

There were 40 more grass fires in 1957 than in 1956.

The department was called to assist on three out-of-town fires, made 14 ambulance calls, answered two false alarms and was called to the scene of a train wreck.




