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

# Give Data on Cancer Here

"An estimated 2500 of those of us now living in Lincoln will develop cancer at some time during our lives and 1500 will die of the disease if present rates continue." These facts and other sta-tistical data were made public today by the American Cancer Society. Here in Lincoln, based on population, the ACS report estimates that 27 cancer patients will be new cases diagnosed for the first time. About 9 residents of Lincoln will be saved from cancer during 1958 and about 18 will die of the disease.

From the figures quoted one in every three cancer patients is now being saved. If cancer strikes, there is a fifty-lifty chance - provided the cancer can be diagnosed early enough and properly treated.


