His name in vain." Considering how men, and often women, disobey this command, we wonder if they ever had any Bible teaching.

"Keep the Sabbath day to sanctify it, as the Lord thy God hath commanded thee. Six days thou shalt labour, and do all thy work: but the seventh day is the sabbath of the Lord thy God." — Deut. 5:12-14.

This may be somewhat difficult for some. Mothers of teenagers who are always hungry. When I was young, my mother always cooked "Sunday dinner" on Saturday, so that when we all came home from church and Sunday school, we ate it cold and thus minimized the work to be done on the Sabbath.

Read to People By Moses

These are the commands of the Lord which Moses read to his people: "Honour thy father and thy mother; ... Thou shalt not kill. Neither shalt thou commit adultery. Neither shalt thou steal. Neither shalt thou bear false witness against thy neighbour. Neither shalt thou covet ... anything that is thy neighbour's." — Deut. 5:16-21.

These commands, said Moses, "the Lord wrote in two tablets of stone, and delivered them unto me." — Deut. 5:22.

"Beware that thou forget not the Lord thy God, in not keeping His commandments, and His judgments, and His statutes, which I command you this day." If they grew wealthy, Moses warned, "Then thine heart be lifted up, and thou forget the Lord thy God, which brought thee forth out of the land of Egypt, from the house of bondage." — Deut. 8:11-14.

Eliminates Hoodlums

These commands and statutes of God's, Moses said, should be taught to all a man's sons (and daughters) and talked over with them constantly. If young people are brought up in an atmosphere where God's laws are obeyed, and made to understand them, it is difficult to believe that they will go astray and become what the modern world calls "hoodlums," ruining their own lives and the happiness of those near them.

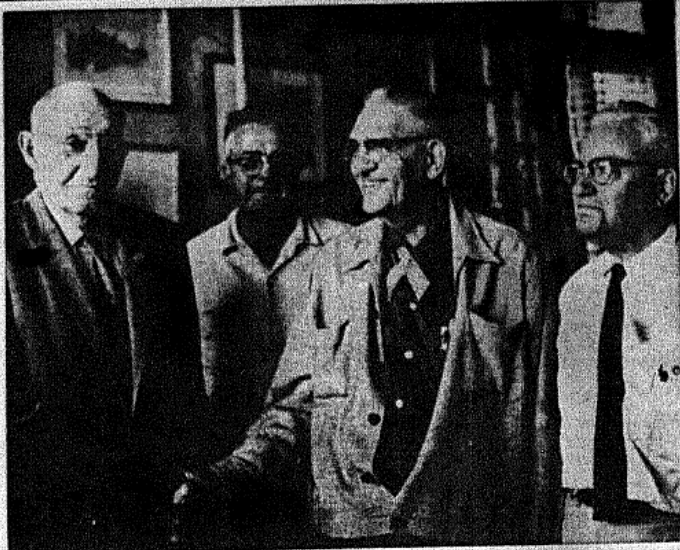

Average Russian Citizen Wants Peace, Gov. Stratton Observes

CHICAGO (AP)—Gov. Stratton expresses confidence that the average Soviet citizen longs for world peace.

Stratton, who toured Russia with eight other governors, left the tour and flew here Sunday so he could greet Britain's Queen Elizabeth II today.

Telling about his 11-day Soviet tour, Stratton said, "The people were unusually warm and friendly. They expressed a deep interest and curiosity about things

American. The governor said, "The Russian people generally are strong for world peace. This in sharp contrast to the official government line which says, in effect, we want peace if you fellows don't cause trouble."

Stratton said he saw printed signs exhorting Soviet farm workers to surpass American farm production. He said he found agriculturists greatly interested in U.S. farm methods, particularly Illinois hybrid corn farming.

In his hotel room Sunday Stratton signed several bills passed by the Illinois General Assembly since he began his tour May 23.

He said he couldn't comment on final legislative developments until he has familiarized himself with the lawmakers' action in his absence. The 1939 session of the legislature ended last week, with the defeat of parts of Stratton's proposed revenue program.

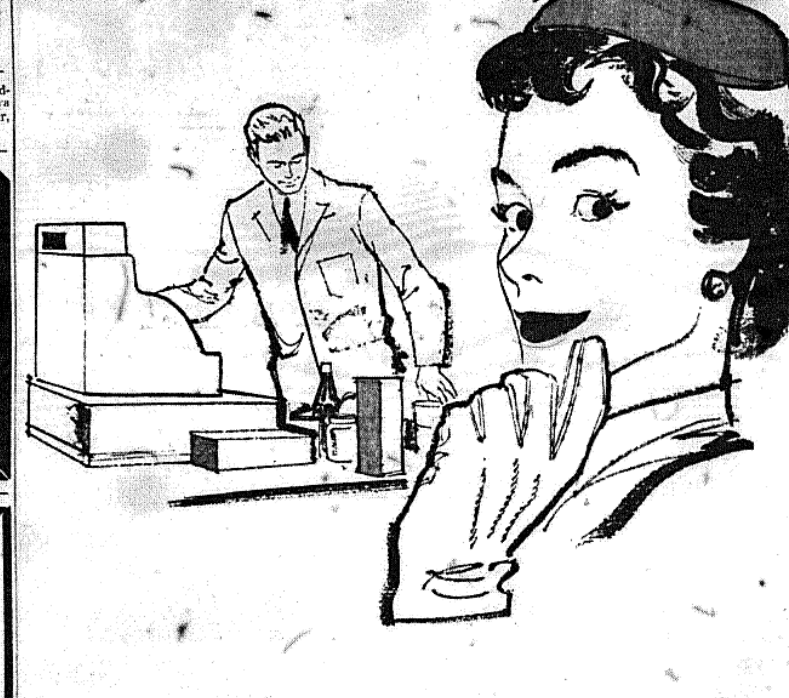

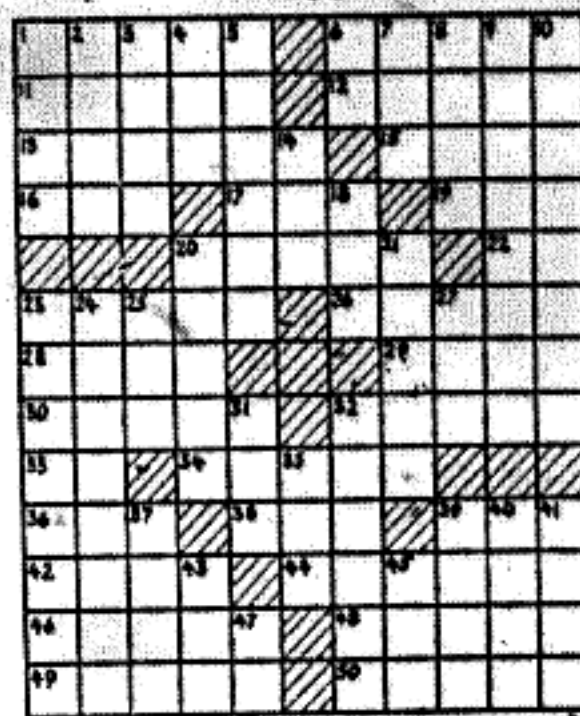

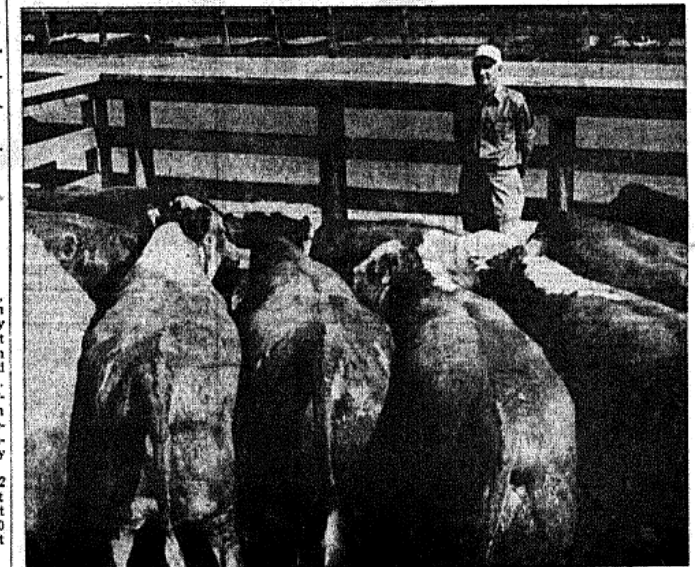

Not Exempt From Tax Warns H

Automatic exemption from estate taxes is NOT granted to estates acquired by counties, park districts, fire departments, cemeteries, educational institutions, religious organizations, charitable institutions, and similar organizations not operating for profit. Logan County Tax Assessor Old G. Perry.

He stresses only two are open to a person or organization seeking such tax exemption: (1) an order by the County Board of Review, the approval of the Department of Revenue; — or (2) an order by a court of "competent jurisdiction".

All requests for such exemptions, moreover, must be made with the Board of Review in session. Only the Board can ascertain if property falls within categories legally entitled to exemption — subject to approval by the Department of Revenue. The Board of Review normally remains in session until Sept. 7.

What steps must be taken to apply, now, for such exemption? The assessor's office suggests the following:

First, produce a photograph of each deed. Then, board, verbally or in writing, the size and the amount of land concerned; use of the land; number, size, number of buildings on the land; and general description of buildings and income from land and from easements.

Rocket Firing Gives Day Off in California Town

SURF, Calif. (AP) — Evacuate! The cry sweeps through this tiny beach town and everything stops.

Navy buses roll down the dusty streets and 35 to 40 men, women and children climb aboard.

At 10 minus 45 minutes, the buses roar away—and everyone in the countryside knows a big rocket is about to be fired.

Surf, Calif., is a stop on the Southern Pacific Railroad, which runs along the coast through the West's new missile launching area.

Air Base Nearby

North of Surf is the 64,000-acre Vandenberg Air Force Base. To the south is Pt. Arguello, the Navy's 19,000-acre missile launching facility.

Discoverer satellite rockets are launched from Vandenberg toward an orbit around the earth's poles. If one of them should explode or have to be destroyed, the debris might fall on Surf and Pt. Arguello.

The day before a Discoverer firing the people at Surf are alerted to get ready for evacuation. A few grumble but most of them, families of track main-

tenance workers, welcome interruption of their quiet existence among the sand dunes.

The civilians evacuate Surf to go shopping in nearby Pismo, see movies at Vandenberg or visit friends. After the firing they are hauled back.

The government foots the bill and reimburses the railroad the time its workmen are out of work. This is a fairly inexpensive operation.

Get Day Off

But everything also stops at Pt. Arguello facility, where missile and space vehicle sites are under construction.

Twenty-four hours before a firing, all workers are notified to take the next day off.

A contractor source says this cost currently at \$100,000 a day.

Discoverer V, originally scheduled to be fired Tuesday, was postponed to Wednesday because of technical problems.

Late Thursday the firing was postponed again, for at least 48 hours. Each day the people at Surf were evacuated to work at Pt. Arguello.

READING, Pa. (AP)—Four children were covering today from arsenic poisoning, but their dog was critically ill. Hospital tests indicated the children had swallowed almost enough arsenic to be fatal.

Authorities said a piece of poisoned bacon, apparently intended for the dog, was found in the yard of the cocker spaniel's owners, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Oswald. The children somehow absorbed poison while playing with the dog Wednesday and came ill.

The youngsters are the Oswald's children, 3, and Robert, 1½, and a neighbor's children, Cindy Lou, 4, and Lou-Ann Vitalo, 2. Police are trying to find the person who placed the bacon in the yard.

State Takes in Reservation

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — A bill making the timber-rich Menominee Indian Reservation Wisconsin's 72nd county was signed into law Thursday, giving the state its first geographic change in 58

years. Its 365 square miles will make it 64th in size.
