

Summer Playground Registration Slated

Opening day registration for summer playgrounds is scheduled for June 16-17 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. according to San Hill, superintendent. Five playgrounds will be in operation — at Washington, Melrose, and Postville Parks, Central School, and Woodlawn field with two trained leaders at each.

Activities will be offered to boys and girls from 5 to 15 years of age. Children under five must be accompanied by an adult. Children may also register after opening day registration.

Activities to be offered at each playground include arts and crafts, story-telling, special events, music, sports, puppetry, active games, table games, and dramatics.

A Day Camp is also scheduled for Saturdays this summer at Lincoln Memorial Park from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. under direction of Carolyn Hill. Children will take sack lunches and 50 cents a day to cover milk and program expenses. Dates for the Day Camp will be announced later.

Activities to be included at the Day Camp include archery, B-B gun, hiking, nature crafts, outdoor education, collections, story-telling, dramatics, sports and games.

A summer band-baton program will begin June 15, with registration to be May 23 and 25 at Central School. Instrumental instruction will be given for children in fourth grade through high school and baton lessons for those from kindergarten through high school. The course will run eight weeks with a \$1.50 registration fee.

The Recreation Center will be open from 1 to 4 p.m. weekdays for high school youths. Dances and special activities will be featured Tuesday, Friday and Saturday nights for card-carrying teenagers.

The heading "Who Shall Lead Us?" persons, including Govs. Price Daniel and Ellington of Tennessee, House members; and Louis Johnson, former sec-

ret indirectly attacked what it said of experience of Sen. John F. Kennedy contrasted with the Senate Democratic nomination for a nation-wide telegraphic and radio urging him to become an active nomination.

Easier Credit
Helps Advance
Stocks Friday

NEW YORK (AP) — Steels, rails, motors, some oils and other neglected issues advanced today on news of easing credit. Trading was moderate early this afternoon.

Front-running electronics and other "science" stocks were subjected to further profit taking. They lost from 1 to 3 points.

Gains of pivotal issues in other sections of the list went mostly from fractions to about a point, steels cutting early gains which in some cases ran to about 2.

"Street" Encouraged

Wall Street was encouraged by the Federal Reserve Board's approval of a reduction in the discount rate from 4 per cent to 3 1/2 per cent in the district banks of Philadelphia and San Francisco.

But a move toward easier credit was partly anticipated by Thursday's rallying market and a vigorous early rise lost steam as trading progressed this afternoon.

The most bullish effect of the discount rate was on the bond market. A scattering of "yield" stocks and high-grade preferreds made gains on the Big Board.

The Dow Jones industrial average at noon was up 2.19 at 630.06.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks at noon was up .70 to 216.60 with the industrials up 1.10, the rails up .90 and the utilities unchanged.

U.S. government bonds jumped sharply. Corporates advanced over an extremely broad front.

Grain Futures Mostly Lower

CHICAGO — A late Friday rally raised wheat futures narrowly to the plus side for the week but the market otherwise continued its downward trend.

Most grains were off 1½ cents a bushel or more in spots while soybeans finished only slightly easier.

Weather was the major consideration in the unusually slow trade, probably the smallest volume for any comparable period in many months. Until Friday, the total for any day had not exceeded about 18½ million bushels compared with a normal of twice that amount.

Frequent rain over much of the Midwest corn belt and muddy fields provided the only bullish influence but it was discounted abruptly with clearing weather later in the week. At that time, a number of private reports said corn planting, about two weeks behind normal in much of the major producing areas, was moving along rapidly.

With moisture reserves plentiful, brokers said germination and growth would be rapid and that there was no reason to believe either acreage or yield would be curtailed more than slightly.

Population up 28 Million in Decade in U.S.

WASHINGTON — A record growth of 28 million in the last decade has rocketed the U. S. population to 179½ million, says the Census Bureau.

The total is subject to revision. The figure released Thursday was based on the actual count of 177,733,190 persons and on estimates of those still to be listed.

Census officials credited the big increase during the 1950s to a climbing birth rate and a continued low death rate. By comparison, the increase in the 1840s was 19 million. In the 1930s it was 8,900,000.

Thursday's totals came from quick tabulations by field offices. The detailed final count will be announced later.

GAINS IN ILLINOIS

WASHINGTON — Preliminary 1960 census figures show the population of Illinois has jumped by 14.6 per cent in the last 10 years.

Figures released Thursday showed the state's population as 9,981,617. Ten years ago the census showed 8,712,176 residents.

Farm Program Goal Set By Demo Policy Makers

CHICAGO — A farm program that would bring "supplies into balance with demand at fair prices" has been set as a goal by Democratic policy makers discussing a farm plank for the 1960 platform.

The farm policy committee of the Democratic Advisory Council met for two days and listened to representatives of 20 agricultural groups.

This was included Thursday in the statement of its chairman, Gov. Herschel Loveless of Iowa:

"The big idea that emerges from the deliberations is that farmers are willing to control, or manage, supplies to obtain fair prices and incomes."

Show Willingness
"Farm group after farm group that testified has indicated a willingness to bring supplies into balance with demand by production adjustments."

"Now it becomes the responsibility of the Democratic Party to provide the leadership in working out the program mechanics for bringing supplies into balance with demand at fair prices."

The mechanics of control, Love-

less said, "will be the responsibility of the federal government to equalize the farmers' market power as quickly as possible... a new Democratic administration can promote and help farmers develop truly effective market power through processing and marketing cooperatives."

Want U.S. Action

Low rural area income — "The committee plans to recommend that the federal government take positive action to eradicate rural poverty, once and for all, as quickly as possible."

"Farm families need more adequate credit on liberal terms so they can consolidate farms that are too small to provide a good living into adequate-sized farms. Positive action by the federal government is needed to promote and help finance new industries and business to create more jobs in rural communities."

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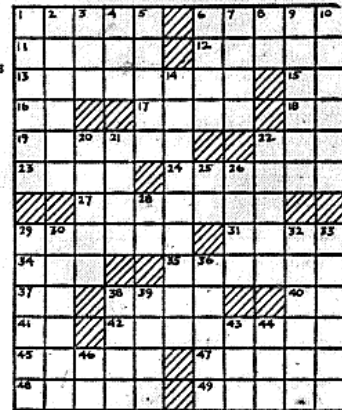

Grain Futures Figures Lower

CHICAGO — Declines on four of the five days this week sent grain futures prices to the lowest levels of the season in several spots and left nearly all contracts well below a week ago.

Losses ranged out to more than four cents a bushel in rye but generally they were in the one to two cent range. The only plus sign, a minimum fraction, was on July soybeans. However, that contract had sunk into a succession of lows over the past two weeks.

The heavy rain and battering hail storm at midweek was the daily bullish consideration in the trade. For a while on Thursday it brought out a substantial volume of short covering and prices worked a cent or more higher before running into profit cashing.

Brokers translated the storm reports to mean possible heavy damage to corn, soybean and oats crops. Corn and soybeans, already late in planting and slow to grow, were believed to have been flooded or washed out of many fields. Corn development had been reported as only about half of normal for this time of year and far behind last year.

NOT BELIEVING:

Khrush Having Trouble
'Poisoning' His People

(Editor's Note—William L. Ryan has revisited the Soviet Union after an absence of seven years. This is the first of 5 stories in which the Russian-speaking news analyst compares the Russians of Stalin and Khrushchev, pointing up the problems that today's Soviet leader faces in trying to discredit the United States. Ryan wrote these uncensored dispatches after leaving Moscow.)

The citizen of Moscow, expert at spotting foreigners, approaches you shyly.

"Excuse me," he says, "are you German?"

You shake your head.

"English?"

You say you are American. The shyness vanishes. He breaks into a broad happy smile and showers you with questions.

The pattern was much the same in many an encounter during long walks in Moscow's hot summer sun.

Unwilling To Believe

The smiles are tokens of one of Nikita Khrushchev's big worries. Many Russians are not willing to believe all he tells them about the West.

That is a factor behind the Kremlin's strenuous campaign to blacken the name of President Eisenhower and villify American leadership. But my experiences, coupled with samplings by competent Western observers in the capital and countryside, indicate that the Russians do not want

relate their fears of dashed dreams to the specter of renewed cold war.

But in the Communist party, the Soviet army and among Communist allies — particularly the Red Chinese — certain elements viewed the Khrushchev peace campaign as dangerous to the communist world movement.

Generate Pressure

In the U.S.S.R. Khrushchev's activities seemed to generate new pressures from the population. Khrushchev himself from time to time reacted with promises and often a show of performance. Some among the eight million members of the ruling Communist party likely were worried. Were their privileges in danger? Just one straw in the wind: some new apartment housing projects were giving priority to those needing housing rather than offering first chance to privileged party members.

Some in the armed forces were annoyed. Officers, high as the rank of general and admiral, had been demobilized and sent to civilian tasks, often as administrators of enterprises in remote, primitive areas — hardly suitable places for officers' ladies accustomed to the amenities of a privileged caste.

Khrushchev evidently reacted to these pressures.

Not Easily Accepted

The U2 incident provided an opportunity to backtrack on the overdose of peace and smiles. At high levels, the cold war was on
