Accounting Ordered for Estate Here

A 13-year old suit, which has outlasted the plaintiff, defendant, and a number of others, was brought back Friday afternoon in a decree signed by Judge Frank S. Bevan in Circuit Court. The suit was filed Feb. 1, 1947, by William Sage and others against Albert Feldman and others.

The decree found that there must be an accounting of the Steve Bennis estate, to be made in connection with claims of miners of the Deer Creek Coal Co.

The conclusion of law showed that stock in the amount of \$312,000 was transferred to and accepted by Steve Bennis pursuant to his original stock subscription of \$147,000 and the later agreement of \$165,000 in stock, the stock to be paid for by the transfer of the mine site to the Deer Creek Coal Co. Corp.; the property was either transferred to the corporation or was not so transferred contrary to the representatives in the documents filed for the qualification of the sale of said shares with the Secretary of State, which is a fraud on the other stockholders and in any event the property in equity belongs to the corporation.

The court held that the subscribed capital stock, as well as its other property, is a trust fund for the benefit of the creditors, and Steve Bennis as a subscriber could not be released from his obligations to pay, and that William F. Bennis and Charles W. Bennis, executors of the Steve Bennis claim the property as a part of the estate but hold the mine site as constructive trustees for the benefit of the Deer Creek Coal Co.

Futures Up, Then Lower

CHICAGO — New crop soybean and corn futures hit or reached the fringes of their highest levels of the season this week on the Board of Trade but failed to hold the peaks.

Soybean subsequently retreated two cents or so a bushel and finished the week with losses of major fractions to a cent while corn held on to small fractions generally. July corn, however, was the broadest gainer of the week with a runup of almost two cents.

As it has been for the past few weeks, weather was the major trading factor despite a private monthly crop report variously described among the trade as both bullish and mildly bearish.

The report by Francis I. du Pont & Co. was termed bullish by comparison with its figures a month earlier. Some traders, though, called it mildly bearish in relation to other more recent trade advices to which the market had reacted in varying degree from time to time.

For example, a few brokers said the soybean acreage was bearish compared with last year's plantings but mildly circulated reports a few weeks ago that it would be up sharply because of delayed corn plantings.

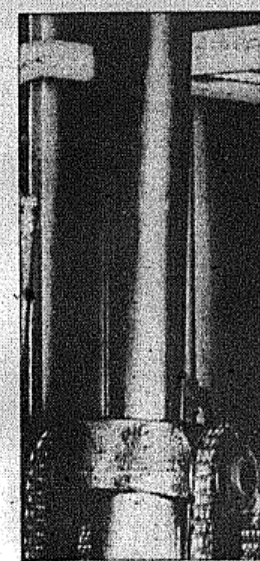

McCarthy Explains 'No' Bond Vote

State Rep. Robert W. McCarthy (D-Lincoln) explained today to the Rotary Club of Mt. Pulaski why he voted during the last session of the Legislature against submitting to the people the bond issues of 195 millions of dollars for higher education and 150 millions of dollars for mental health.

"I am thoroughly in agreement with the needs of the mental hospitals and the institutions of higher learning but I felt the bond issue approach to be wrong at this time. Any time a bond issue passes, the people must face up to find a way to pay off or retire the bonds.

"Our revenue system is out dated and I felt a new constitutional article on revenue should first be adopted; then the Legislature could find the funds to pay for these capital improvements out of current income, thereby saving millions of dollars in interest. If this money is raised now, we face the question of who will get behind a revenue revision when it comes to the people. The previous experience has been that revenue revision fails because of the opposition of special interest groups."

McCarthy offered several alternatives to the bond issues and suggested, if they pass, one method of retiring the bonds. He said, "The bond proposition states that a general state property tax shall be used to retire the bonds except that the Legislature may appropriate other sums of money if it sees fit. The state property tax has not been used since the early 1930's."

"Gov. Stratton, in releasing the schedule of projects on mental health, stated Lincoln State School would, over a period of years, have new construction at a cost of \$13,477,719. This money would be in the State Treasury if the successful bid by the Illinois Merchants Assn. for a tax rebate had been disallowed. This rebate will cost the state over \$7 million a year in sales tax revenue taken from the consumer but not turned into the treasury. The total loss to the state over the 20-year bond period exceeds 144 million dollars."

McCarthy further stated, "That if the bond issues do pass this fall I will spear head an attempt to repeal this retail rebate and allocate the money for the retirement of the bonds."

As earnings reports for the second quarter grew in volume, the same story was being repeated.



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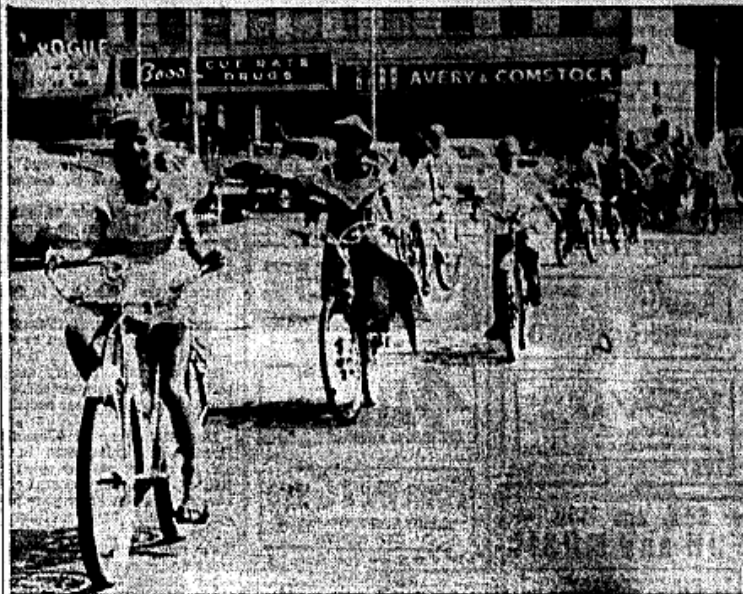

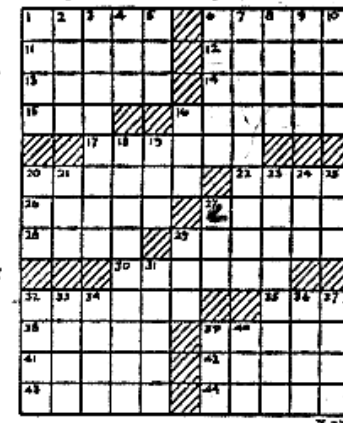

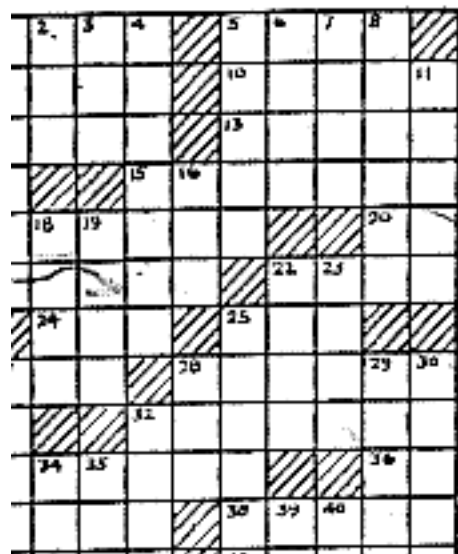
