

Rabies Warning Given in Logan

Dr. M.D. Kvile, Logan County rabies inspector, has received information that a positive case of rabies in a skunk has been reported in the Middletown-Elkhart area.

Anyone noticing any of the following in non-domestic animals should report such incidences to his veterinarian or to Dr. Kvile, if it is asked.

Unprovoked attacking of persons, animals, or objects.

A desire to come close to buildings during the day.

Show none of their wild characteristics.

In domestic animals:

A dog becomes overly friendly or becomes unduly shy.

Animals that cannot eat or swallow.

The unprovoked attacking of persons, animals or objects.

"Let me emphasize, there is no need to be overly alarmed, but I would advise everyone to take the proper precautions," urges Dr. Kvile.

Education Planning Board Asked

CHICAGO (AP)—Gov. Otto Kerner has asked the Illinois Congress of Parents and Teachers to back his proposal for a higher education planning board.

Speaking at the group's final session Saturday, Kerner said a planning board would help stamp out appropriation clashes between the six tax-supported universities.

"The state cannot afford the luxury of having its individual universities going their independent ways," Kerner said.

For Centralized Control

The governor said centralized control would help prevent creation of additional professional schools by political logrolling.

"Competition and clashes between higher educational institutions for appropriations," he said, "tend to raise costs and cheapen the product."

Kerner also asked the group to support moves to further consolidation of school districts. He said the most efficient high schools now cost \$300 per student.

"If the present situation is left unaltered," he said, "Illinois very possible may have some quality

Kenneth Ryan Dies in Chicago

MT. PULASKI—Kenneth Ryan, 61, of Chicago and formerly of Mt. Pulaski, died at 10:55 p. m., Saturday, in Illinois Masonic hospital in that city where he had been a patient for one hour.

The body is at Schabl Funeral Home and arrangements are incomplete.

The decedent was born at Mt. Pulaski, June 10, 1889, the son of James and Armina Ramsey Ryan. He leaves his wife; three sons, Kenneth in New York; James, who is in the Army and stationed in France; and Paul of Chicago; a brother, Charles of Granite City; and a sister, Mrs. Fayette Ross of Lincoln. He was a veteran of World War One.

Chesney Art On Display at L.C.

Lincoln College has on display in the lobby of the Administration building, a collection of 18 paintings by Lee Chesney, professor of art at the University of Illinois.

Chesney says of these pictures, — "much of my work seems to stem from two basic considerations: concern for the troubled psyche, the doubts, the uncertainties, the agonies of indecision, the psychological anguish of modern man; as well as an interest in the mystery and the poetry of nature. In either instance I seek to evoke by poetic metaphor something of my thoughts, feelings and wonderings."

"Certain pieces contain, I am sure, humorous overtones just as others have an air of tragedy. All represent one artist's attempt to set in motion a dialogue between the picture and the viewer, concerning experiences and values considered important by this artist. If occasionally one is encouraged to engage in conversation with one of these works either in agreement or disagreement, then perhaps it is beginning to fulfill the function of a work of art."

Chesney, printmaker and painter, was born in Washington D.C. in 1920. He received a B.F.A. from the university of Colorado in 1942 and a M.F.A. from the State University of Iowa in 1948. He studied at Mill Race Studio in San Antonio, Texas, and in Morelia in Mexico. He taught at the State University of Iowa, University of Colorado (summer) and has been teaching printmaking at the University of Illinois since 1950.

Chesney received a Fulbright Research Fellowship during 1956-57 and spent that year working in Japan.

Several one-man shows have been held in galleries, museums and educational institutions in Wichita, Detroit, Columbus, Chicago, Bloomington and Tokyo, Japan. He has exhibited in many competitive and invitational group

exhibitions. His work is included in American Federation of Arts travelling shows and in the Museum of Modern Art's "Fifty Years of American Art" which toured Europe, in curator's selections circulating in the Scandinavian countries, Japan and Australia. He was represented in the 4th International Biennale at Bordighera, Italy and in the 1st International Print Biennale in Tokyo, Japan.

His works are represented in 35 permanent collections, including The Library of Congress and National Gallery of Art in Washington D.C., The Museum of Modern Art and the American Society of Graphic Artists in New York City, the Oakland Museum of Art in California, two in Tokyo, Japan, two in London, England, one in Paris France and one in Stockholm, Sweden.

NEW YORK (U. S. —) The stock market rally continued early this afternoon in moderate trading. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks at noon was up 1.10 at 245.20 with industrials up 1.50, rails up .60 and utilities up .50. Key stocks advanced from fractions to a point or more on a broad front.

The trend was higher among steels, motors, chemicals, rails, aircraft-missiles, electronics and rubbers. Oils, building materials and drugs were mixed.

Polaroid spurred about 4 points. Allied Chemical was about 2 points higher. Kerr-McGee Oil added more than 2 points to its 5-point jump of Tuesday.

Jones & Laughlin gained more than a point. Other major steel-makers were fractionally higher. Off slightly were Merck, Liggett & Myers and Royal Dutch.

The Dow Jones industrial average at noon was up 3.91 at 688.25. Corporate bonds were firm, U.S. government bonds were up fairly sharply.





S.E.C. Will Investigate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's 13 organized stock markets have a big stake in the forthcoming federal investigation of the American Stock Exchange, the second largest.

In announcing plans for the inquiry, the Securities and Exchange Commission said Monday it wants to find out whether new laws or regulations are needed to protect investors against market rigging and other shenanigans.

If the rules are changed, officials said, the revision probably will apply equally to all stock exchanges.

The American Exchange is the only direct target of the new inquiry. It was singled out as a result of an SEC investigation of two of its members, Jerry and Gerard Re.

The SEC on May 4 ordered the Re's expelled from the exchange on charges of widespread price-rigging and illegal stock sales between 1954 and 1960.


