**Youths Lose Police Chase**

Three youths led area law enforcement officers a merry chase early Monday morning.

Finally halted by state police on Rt 66 near Atlanta were Ronald Martinie, 17, of Beason, the driver of the speeding car; and Gary Lee List, 19, of 634 Seventh st. and David R. Crawford, 20, of 704 N. Monroe.

**\$150 FINE ASSESSED**

Brought before Justice of the Peace John Turner of Atlanta at 2 a.m. Monday, Martinie was charged by Lincoln police with illegal possession of liquor by a minor and reckless driving. State police charged him with speeding 80 miles an hour in a 60 mile zone. Turner fined the driver \$120 plus costs on the three charges.

Justice Turner set bond for Martinie's passengers, List and Crawford, at \$100 each, when both pleaded not guilty to charges of illegal possession of liquor by a minor. Unable to furnish bond, they were jailed.

Monday Martinie appeared before Magistrate Edgar Thompson on an added charge of violating the Lincoln curfew law. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Martinie of Beason, were fined \$75 for their son's violation. This was Martinie's third violation of the curfew ordinance, officers said, and the law makes the parents responsible for the violation.

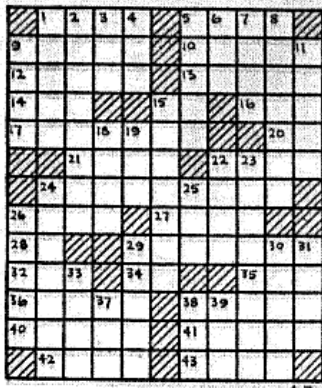

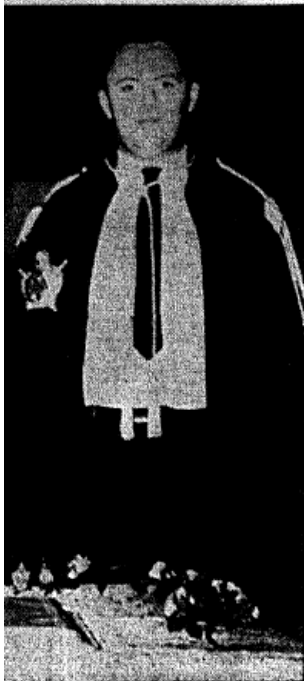

After repeatedly imploring them to join Him in His watch, Jesus returned to them a final time and said, "Sleep on now, and take your rest: it is enough, the hour is come; behold, the Son of man is betrayed into the hands of sinners." Upon the speaking of these words, He was seized by a band of men led by Judas, the disciple who betrayed Him for 30 pieces of silver.

# From Nazareth to Calvary

(EDITOR'S NOTE — A Camel Driver, an Arab horseman, a camel caravan — it might have been that Holy Week millennia ago when Christ and His followers passed along this winding, dusty road to Jerusalem. Here a traveler retraces that momentous procession, linking the past to the present. This is the second of five articles on the locale of the Easter drama.)

**PART 2**  
By GEORGE W. CORNELL (AP Religion Writer)

JERICHO, Jordan — He passed this way one fateful day. A country man from Galilee. Going to the city. He and His apostles, Roughshod, thoughtful men, of weathered brow. Going to Jerusalem.

It is a dusty road, some 90 miles of dusty road, cutting through Samaria, or following the Jordan River plain. The road is paved in parts today. It's dusty even with the pavement. Then, the pavement wasn't there.

Just the dust. And tramping on, begrimed of flesh and torn in spirit.

"Let us go again into Judea," Jesus told His men. It would be the final time. "Let us go also," Thomas said, "that we may die with him." And so, the 12 began the trip, aloof.

**Travels Route by Car**  
My wife and I were driven over it by car.

The area is old, so old, as old as when He passed this way. You see the black-wool bedouin tents. You see the plodding camels pulling wooden walking plows. You see the oil lamps and matted rooftops strewn with drying figs.

And sun and dust—dust devils whirling, darting, playing in the thorny magary and sage.

Sebastia is 40 miles into the mountains north of here, and whether Jesus took that route across Samaria, or veered along the river, He undoubtedly was conscious of the spot as He passed near.

**Was Kings Retreat**  
For that is where King Herod had a sumptuous retreat, where Salome supposedly performed for John the Baptist's head, and where, as one tradition has it, the firebrand herald of the Savior spent his last imprisoned

days.

We descended to the jail. Three men took turns in struggling with a rusty lock and eight-inch key before that ancient, creaking door was opened. Far below, down 20 steps, the narrow rockhewn cell was dank and dark. A pair of tiny, slanting vents cast specks of light where long ago the shaggy Baptist may have sat.

"There is not a greater prophetic... Jesus once had said of him.

On higher ground, remains of Herod's castle stand amid the uncompleted excavations, hoary ghosts of moldy majesty. Tribunals, towers, statues, massive chambers, balconies, a stadium and colonnades.

Untold domains have yet to be uncovered, here as elsewhere in the Holy Land, the work undone for lack of funds. Bright-eyed, threadbare boys thereabouts were peddling Caesar's ancient coins that haunt the soil for seven fils — just 20 cents. A hollow royal pillar, shattered lengthwise, serves the village as a public water trough for horses, mules and goats.

**First Shall Be Last**  
"The first shall be the last... the last shall be the first..."

He passed this way, or somewhere near. A few miles east, a valley spreads between the rugged mountains. High on either side rear the wooded peaks of Gerezim and Ebal. On the edge of Ebal is the hamlet of Sychar, beside the Mahneh plain.

When Jesus crossed it on a prior trip, the jaded woman of Samaria encountered Him at Jacob's well. It still is there, the slaty rock that forms its cupshaped head—worn deep with grooves around the opening by countless drawing ropes.

We drew a bucketful. It tasted cool, delicious fresh. Hot and weary, Jesus drank there, too, and told the trollop of Sychar: "Whoever drinks of water that I give will never thirst..." And she became a fervent advocate.

Moving south and east, the rough limestone terrain is flecked with herds of dusky sheep. An Arab horseman now and then. A camel train, with swaying leads, the driver on a donkey.

These horses are the kings on this remote and rustle range, their limbs like thin and tapered steel, their muscles huge, their

heads held high, with wise and flashing eyes.

**In Dusty Stride**  
Ahead the vast and hilly Jordan plain is sorrel in the sun. He passed this way, in dusty stride. Past bramble, crags and sandy dunes. Past isolated nomad tents, or huts of rock, with bantam roosters, guinea pigs and toddlers at the door. Past children carrying wood, or sowing grain by hand. One lovely, frisky little girl in rags we met was named "Kawkab" — or "Walking Star."

"Let the little children come to me... forbid them not..." He passed this way. Past the distant hills of Gilead and Moab, east beyond the Jordan, where old Moses viewed the promised land from Nebo's peak. Past the Valley of the Dancers to the west, where ancient men of Judah, short of women, kidnapped wives by night and whisked them through a tunnel in the mountains.

The sun is naked white and hot above the plain. The air is still, and dancing rings of light and dust come in the air. My wife, Jo Ann, felt queasy, blaming it on Jacob's water. But there's no stopping place around. Somewhere, paused along this road, however, Jesus told His men again, "The Son of Man will be delivered... crucified... and raised..." It left them bleak and baffled.

**Baptized at River Ford**  
Down along the winding river bank, the willows, rushes, cane and tamarisk make up a dense procession. Full of insects, singing birds, wild boars, and chattering things. A muddy ford just east of Jericho is said to be the spot at which He was baptized.

They came to Jericho, its rich and spreading fields profuse with citrus groves, banana palms and dates. It also has Miami Beachlike winter residences now. But it's as old as all the rest.

The excavations there have yielded ruins that date to 8,000 B.C., older by 5,000 years than Egypt's pyramids. He passed this way, enroute to die, but stayed a day to help a hated publican regain his inner health — the man who climbed a sycamore to see Him passing by.

Jerusalem is 30 miles from here. Along the road, as Jesus left, the blind cried, "Have mercy... Son of David..." So He did, and they were healed. He

traveled on.

## Business, Industry Hear Reports on L.C. Progress

Approximately 75 representatives of Lincoln business and industry attended a banquet Wednesday evening at Lincoln college where they heard college officials give a progress report on the local junior college.

Wilbur Layman, vice president, outlined the college's progress over the last 10 years. He told the guests that some \$450,000 has been spent on campus projects and \$500,000 has been expended through federal housing loans on dormitories.

It was announced that an estimated \$25,000 will eventually be added to the library fund by virtue of a gift from Mrs. James W. McGrath of Lincoln. The money resulted from the sale of her N. Union street residence to O.M. Small of Topeka, Kan. The college, through a contractual arrangement, served as intermediary in the sale.

This summer, Layman said, the college will spend \$30,000 enlarging and refurbishing the student union. Also under construction now, he said, is a men's dorm which will cost \$350,000 when furnished.

Linked With Centennial  
Guests were told that the next major project of the college will be the construction of a library and museum at a cost of \$400,000. It is hoped to have this completed by 1965 in time for the college's centennial.

Layman pointed out that in 13 years the college annual budget has grown from \$85,000 to \$350,000.

President Raymond Dooley explained the educational policy of the two-year school, saying that the college seeks to develop the individual socially and intellectually.

John W. Huck of Chicago, executive director of the College Association of Illinois, addressed the members of business and industry.

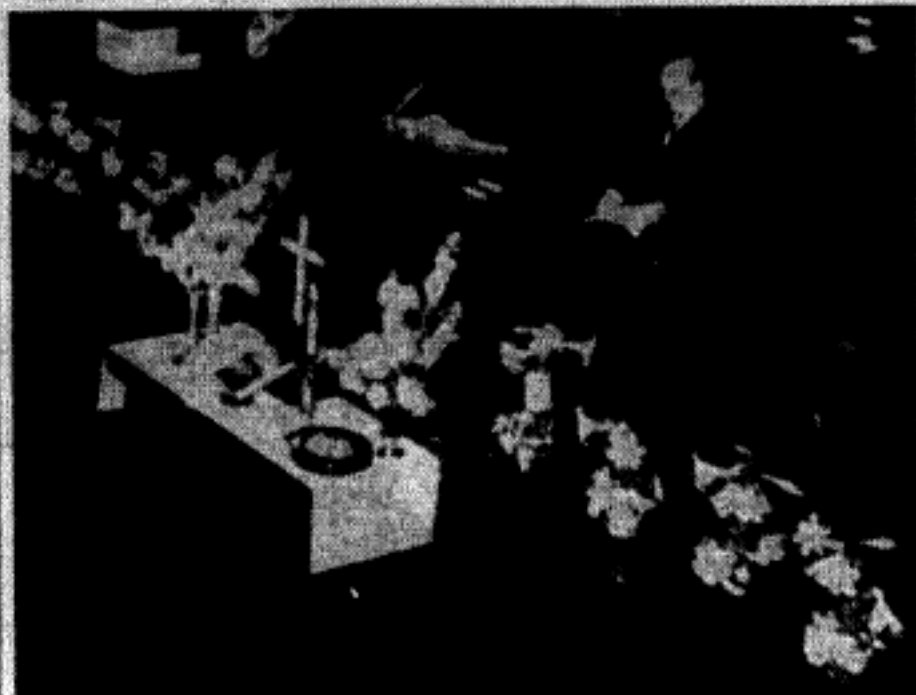

## U.S. Aid in Viet Counts

**SAIGON, South Viet Nam** — For five months the United States has been beefing up South Viet Nam's military muscles. The results are beginning to show.

Since last December, when Washington decided to back the little republic to the hilt in its struggle against Communist guerrillas, U.S. arms, advice and support have reached nearly every level at which the fight is being waged.

U.S. naval advisors accompany the armed junks protecting Viet Nam's coast. U.S. Air Force pilots are in the cockpits of Vietnamese fighters.

U.S. Army advisors are in jungles, forests and marshes, working with Vietnamese commanders down to the company level.

More than 80 U.S. Army and Marine helicopters are carrying missions, landing Vietnamese soldiers practically atop their targets.

Somewhere in the South China Sea, elements of the U.S. 7th Fleet are patrolling, ready to strike if outside Communist powers should ever decide on open intervention here.

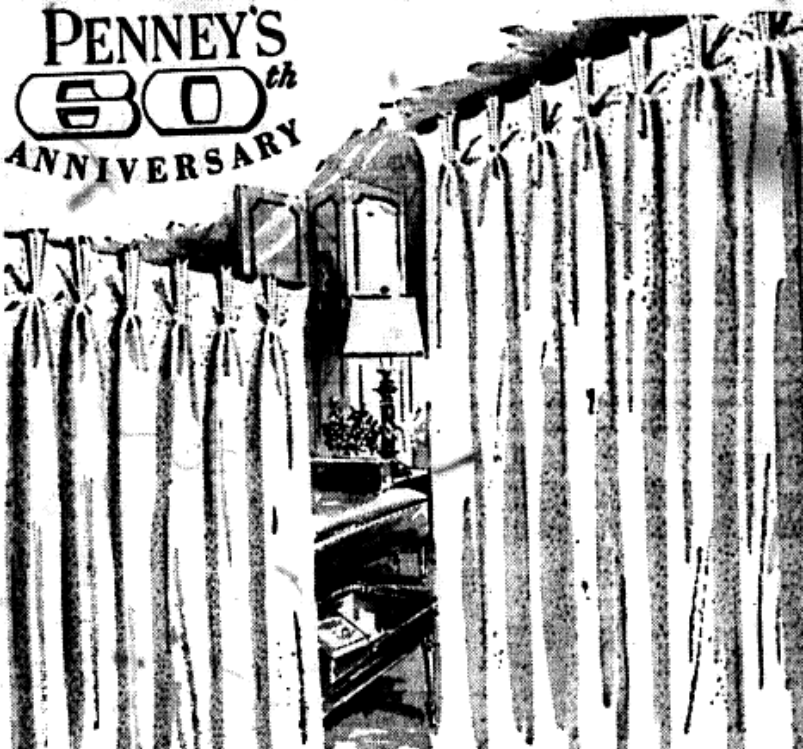
