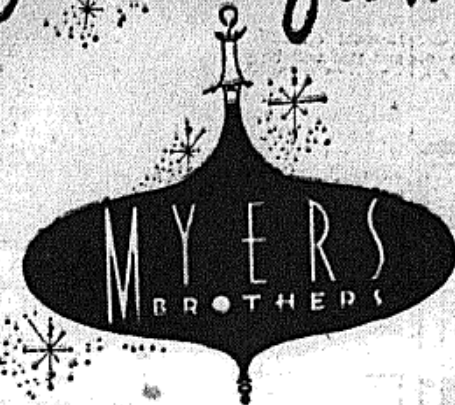

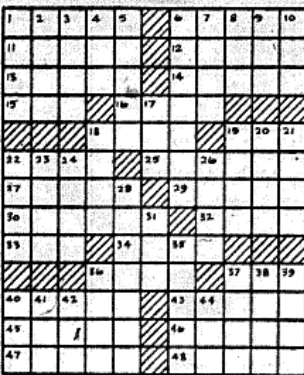

end, placing Illinois high among the leaders in traffic fatalities.

A surge of fatal accidents during the homeward rush Tuesday pushed the state total far above last year's number, but considerably less than the record number—58—killed in 1956. Last year's total was 26 for a three-day Christmas weekend.

During the 102-hour holiday weekend, 7 other persons were killed in fires and 3 died in miscellaneous accidents directly attributed to the holiday, for a total of 48.

ROADS HAZARDOUS

The holiday, which began at 6 p.m. (local time) Friday, ended at midnight Tuesday with most of the state's highways slicked with packed snow and freezing rain.

Southern Illinois roads were glassy from freezing rain and highways in the northern sector were snow-packed from a Christmas day storm, making hazardous conditions and bringing a terse alert from the Illinois Division of Highways.

The death toll included 11 in the Chicago area. Police said 2,599 accidents were reported in Chicago—405 which caused injuries.

Four separate accidents killed nine people.

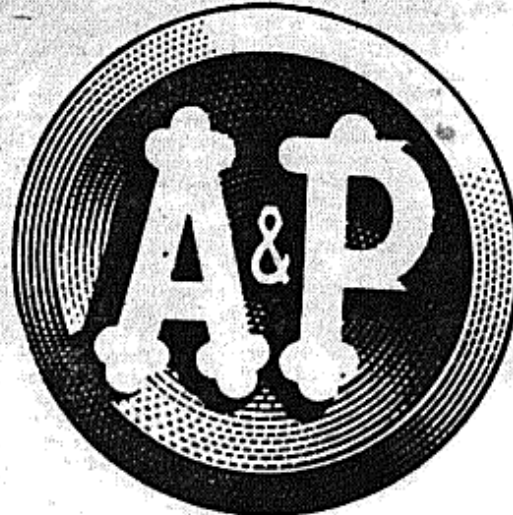

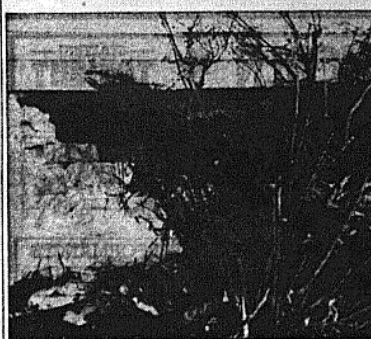

New Year's Resolutions Need Backing by Parents

Do you avoid making good resolutions about school work because you think you'll never keep them anyway? Then you may have been making resolutions the wrong way.

With the semester ending in another month, many students realize their need for a spurt in learning. But the resolution: "I am going to study more," brings little results. In fact, trying to force yourself to study probably will have a negative effect.

Students often say to me: "I want to succeed. I know I should study more. But I just can't seem to settle down to it."

These students often are subject to pressures and tensions because there is a conflict in their minds as to whether they are taking the right courses and the right major.

Major is Doubled
Fred, a college sophomore, was registered as a physics major. He was making a C in physics. His statement of his own problem:

"Even though I try to make myself study, I neglect it. Maybe I'm in the wrong line—I'm not quite sure what major I want."

The plan that solved Fred's problem can solve yours, too.

Having already signed up for the course, he made a new kind of resolution. Instead of just saying he would study harder, he resolved to start at the beginning.
