

### Soviet Told-No Change by Japan

TOKYO IN - Japan has told the Soviet Union its admission of U.S. nuclear submarines to Japanese ports will not be a step toward admitting American nuclear weapons to Japan.

Foreign Minister Masayoshi Ohira told Soviet Ambassador Vladimir M. Vinogradov Wednesday the Japanese decision to allow U.S. nuclear-powered submarrines to visit Japanese ports should be of no concern to the Soviet government.

He said the decision applies only to submarines which carry no nuclear weapons and does not mean an important change in Japanese arms capabilities, he added.

"It is clear," the Soviet note said, "That submarines, which for the start might even call at Japanese ports without missiles, are




