"I am also grateful to a system of administration in this penitentiary, as directed by Warden Ross Randolph, which gives an inmate an opportunity to learn a trade or to further his

education. Warden Rand is a great penologist and he will regard me as his

"I am also grateful to many friends who have aided me and written to me. I was in prison and to my aid and friends who worked to secure my freedom. Truly wonderful friends cannot say too many nice about them.

"Finally, I go to a new life in my home town. I ask of you or expect none, I want to earn a place as a good citizen in my community."

Two of the eight were dead. The body of a ninth crewman, who had been knocked off the line during the rescue operation, was recovered several hours later.

### Lost Their Lives

The dead were Willard Hull, 44, and Archie Wilson, 41, both of Pensacola, Fla., and Wesley Eli Haslett, 35, of Theodore, Ala. The skipper, Max Alford, 43, suffered broken ribs.

Treated for shock and exposure and released were John Summers, 35; John Grey, 43; John Tucker, 49; David Grigg, 21; and C. G. Smith, 50, all of Pensacola.

The men had been aboard the 57-foot Sea Horse, out of Bayour La Batre, Ala. She left that port Saturday.

Smith said the trawler began shipping water about 5:30 p.m. that day.

A gale-like north wind hit them that night, and the Sea Horse headed for port.

After the Nike showed up at 2:50 a.m. Sunday, the crewmen, with lifebelts on, lashed themselves together and went overboard seconds before the Sea Horse sank.

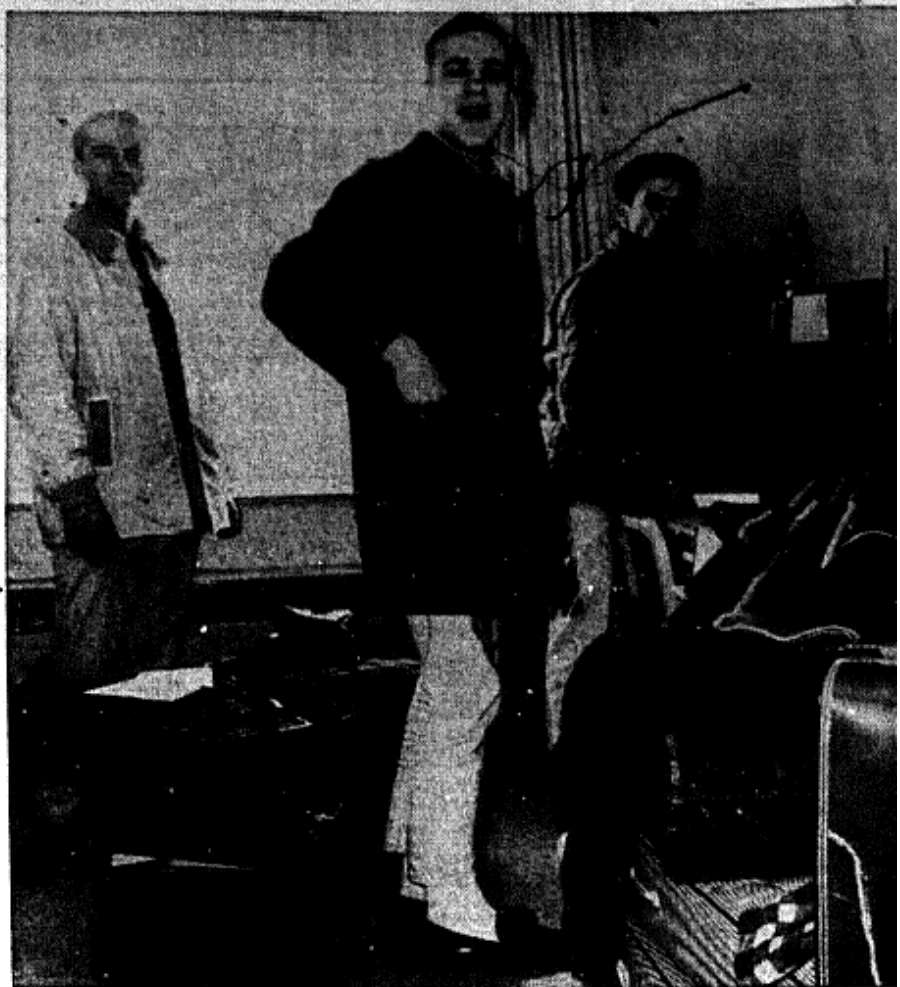

## Soviet Told—No Change by Japan

**TOKYO** — Japan has told the Soviet Union its admission of U.S. nuclear submarines to Japanese ports will not be a step toward admitting American nuclear weapons to Japan.

Foreign Minister Masayoshi Ohira told Soviet Ambassador Vladimir M. Vinogradov Wednesday the Japanese decision to allow U.S. nuclear-powered submarines to visit Japanese ports should be of no concern to the Soviet government.

He said the decision applies only to submarines which carry no nuclear weapons and does not mean an important change in Japanese arms capabilities, he added.

"It is clear," the Soviet note said, "That submarines, which for the start might even call at Japanese ports without missiles, are

WAUKEGAN, Ill. (U) — The performance of the popular comedy that was interrupted by Lincoln's assassination 97 years ago will be reenacted Tuesday-complete with the fatal shooting.

A new version of "Our American Cousin" will run much the same as it did April 14, 1865, when the Civil War president saw it in Ford's Theater in Washington, D. C.

But toward the end of the third act, an actor portraying John Wilkes Booth will "shoot" Lincoln in a second-tier box and leap to the stage.

"We'll probably be the only group marking Lincoln's assassination on his birthday," Robert Vogel, director of the Lake County Museum of History, said.

The benefit performance will be the kickoff of a campaign to raise \$325,000 for a new museum building and perpetuation of mu-

## NASON ON EDUCATION:

# Techicians Filling Vital Role, Worthy of Respect

By LESLIE J. NASON, Ed. D.  
(Professor of Education,  
U. of S. California)

In this age of emphasis on higher education, let's not underrate the technicians.

The ones who train their hands at the same time they train their minds are laying an excellent foundation for ultimate success even beyond their immediate specialties.

And our country needs people with special skills. President Kennedy's panel of consultants on vocational education reported that up to 200,000 new technicians will be needed each year during the 1960's.

These technicians require post-high school training. So it is imperative that we offer training programs in our schools to give technical trainees the opportunities to continue their education with a minimum loss of credit and standing.

#### Give College Credit

There is no reason why courses in English, history, civics, math and science, which are a part of many technical training programs, cannot be evaluated for credit toward the Associate of Arts degrees given by two-year colleges.

The courses can be so designed that if a student changes his ultimate objective, he will be prepared to enter a university or state college with some advanced standing.

Often during such training, students discover they can understand involved instructions readily. For the first time some gain

confidence in their ability to learn. Often they raise their goals and many continue on for bachelor's degrees.

Still other students gain an interest and skill in learning that helps carry them on to responsible positions in business and industry.

#### Too Many Drifters

So it's important that we keep open these avenues of training.

The fear that their advancement may be blocked by lack of formal training deters many capable students from entering technical training programs. As a result, we are left with a large group of drifters. They waste their time and talents — for they do not work toward a goal.

If we redesign our programs so capable students can elect such training without fear of entering a dead-end street, we can salvage many of these people.

Instead of drifting, they will gain the satisfaction which accompanies learning, and can continue to advance happily for the rest of their lives.

As in the earlier bill, the cost of the medical care would be borne largely by a boost in Social Security taxes. It would mean a maximum of \$13 a year for each employee, and a like sum for his employer. It amounts to one-fourth of 1 per cent for the first \$5,200 of the employee's income.

There are now, the President said, 17.5 million Americans aged 65 or older—and that number will swell to 25 million by 1980.

The tax proposals, spelled out by the President in an earlier message, include such benefits for the elderly as:

A \$300 tax credit for everyone over age 65.

Unlimited deductions for medical and drug expenses.

The generally lower tax rates which would apply to all taxpayers if the tax program is adopted.

Khrushchev accused the United States of dragging out negotiations at Geneva, then mentioned the two to three inspections annually which the United States considers far too few.

"Nothing else can be expected from us," he said.

Khrushchev declared earlier in his speech that "in the age of rocket-nuclear weapons, the policy of peaceful coexistence is the only sensible policy."

In an election speech to 5,000 voters in the Kremlin, the Soviet premier emphasized the co-existence theme, which clashes with Peking's views of a tougher policy in dealing with the West.

"The general line of the foreign policy of our state," he said, "is to uphold and strengthen peace, to assert the principles of peaceful coexistence in the relations between states with different social systems."

The elections for the Soviet Union's Parliament will be held Sunday.

Khrushchev devoted his opening remarks to Soviet agriculture, saying that "The Soviet people are maintaining a good pace in peaceful economic competition with the United States of America."
