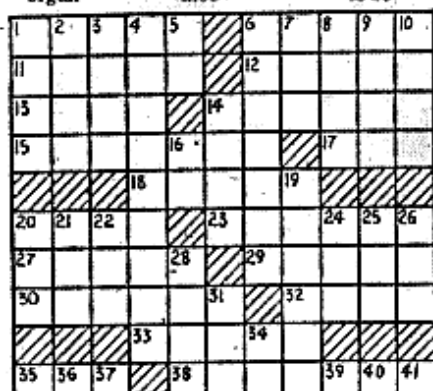

## L.C.C. Graduating Class Of 1964 Largest of Any

Members of the largest graduating class in the 20 year history of Lincoln Christian College received diplomas at the commencement Friday evening before a standing-room-only crowd in the auditorium of Lincoln Christian Church.

Speaker was Prof. Marion E. Henderson, who has been associated with the school from its earliest days.

The bachelor of arts degree in ministerial science was awarded to 28 candidates, while there were 25 who received the same degree in Christian education. In the department of missions there were four to receive the A. B. degree, three in sacred music, and one in secretarial science. In all, there were 54 graduating seniors, a few of them completing work in more than one department. In the seminary there were seven candidates receiving eight degrees.

Presiding was Pres. Earl C. Hargrove, and the candidates for degrees were presented by Dean John M. Webb of the college, and Dean Eng E. Dowling, of the seminary. Other

Kief donned the badge of sheriff in 1941 to fill out the unexpired term of the late Pete Moos, next was elected treasurer of Logan for a 4-year term (1942-1946). Final day for the purchase and display of bicycle licenses for the year 1964 will be July 1, it was announced Wednesday by police Chief Earl Minder. The schedule for purchase of the 25 cent licenses is as follows:

June 13, names ending in A through L at the Recreation Center; ages 6 to 8, 9 to 10 a.m.; ages 8-10, 10 to 11 a.m.; ages 10 to 12, 11 to 12 noon; ages 12 to 14, 1 to 2 p.m.; ages 14 to 16, 2 to 3 p.m.; age 16 and over, 3 to 4 p.m.

June 20 the same schedule will be followed for those whose names end in N through Z. The 27th of June will be the final day to purchase the license; all not having purchased same by that date may do so, appearing any time at the Recreation Center.

Ten years ago —After losing a vote of confidence in the French National Assembly, Premier Joseph Laniel submitted the resignation of his cabinet.

Five years ago—Queen Elizabeth's husband, Prince Philip, laid the symbolic keel of the Dreadnought, the first British nuclear-powered submarine.

ed States and Juarez in Mexico, the Mexican official remarked that when both died in office their countries had changed politically, socially and economically. "Modern history begins with Lincoln in the United States and with Juarez in Mexico," he declared.

Pointing to other instances of the "Modernity of Lincoln", the speaker recalled reading a letter written by a man who was talking to Lincoln on that fateful Good Friday night in 1865. The conversation, according to the letter, dealt with the construction of the Panama Canal.

In concluding his remarks on Lincoln, the historian quoted 15th president in his address at Cooper Union, in which Lincoln stated that "we are not bound to follow implicitly in whatever our fathers did." To do so, according to Lincoln, "would be to discard all the lights of current experience to reject all progress and all improvements."

He also quoted the New Salem citizen on his remarks: "The dogmas of the quiet past are inadequate to the stormy present."

As our case is new, so we must think anew, and act anew. We must disenthrall ourselves. . . .

In closing, the speaker told the graduates that everything seems feasible now.

"That is our good fortune, and your great challenge, because it is now more difficult than perhaps ever before in history of man to quiet the hopes and anxieties of those who are denied the spiritual and material satisfactions open to many in your country, and to fewer in mine. If in the United States you keep your allegiance to the ideals of Abraham Lincoln and the younger generations of Mexico to those of Benito Juarez, which are fundamentally the same, our two countries have nothing to fear."

An honorary doctor of Laws degree was conferred on His Excellency by Lincoln College President Dr. Raymond Dooley. An honorary doctor of divinity degree went to Howard B. Withers pastor, Parma-South Presbyterian church, Cleveland, Ohio. (Citations text in another story on this page)

## New Civil Rights Group Stages March in Chicago

CHICAGO (U) — Some 300 persons, a few carrying lighted candles, walked a six-mile route from the South Side early today to the downtown Federal Building and set up a continuous picket line around the building.

The demonstration by Negroes and whites, ranging in age from seven to in the 60s, was sponsored by a new civil rights organization called ACT in protest against the forcible removal of pickets last week from offices and hallways in the building.

### Led By Comedian

Comedian Dick Gregory led the marchers. The group started shortly after midnight at the intersection of 55th Street and Indiana Avenue and arrived at the Federal Building at about 2:30 a.m. The group disbanded after picketing for about one hour.

Police said the walkers moved briskly in the street, two abreast, and caused only minimal interference with vehicular traffic. A sound truck preceded the pro-

housing, inferior educational and menial jobs, etc."

The statement also said that "ACT feels that other civil rights organizations have neglected this aspect of the struggle, there by creating a vacuum of discontent among the Negro masses. ACT intends to right this weakness in the fights for civil rights."
