

## Stocks Mixed

NEW YORK — Stocks improved in a thoroughly mixed stock market early this afternoon. Trading was moderate. Gains and losses of most key stocks were fractional.

The even-even nature of the market was mirrored by the Associated Press average of 60 stocks which at noon was unchanged at 326.4, with the industrial, rail and utility components also unchanged — a highly unusual showing.

The Dow Jones Industrial average at noon showed a slight loss of .28 at 875.09 but the Dow Jones average of 65 industrials, rails and utilities was up .22 at 310.27.

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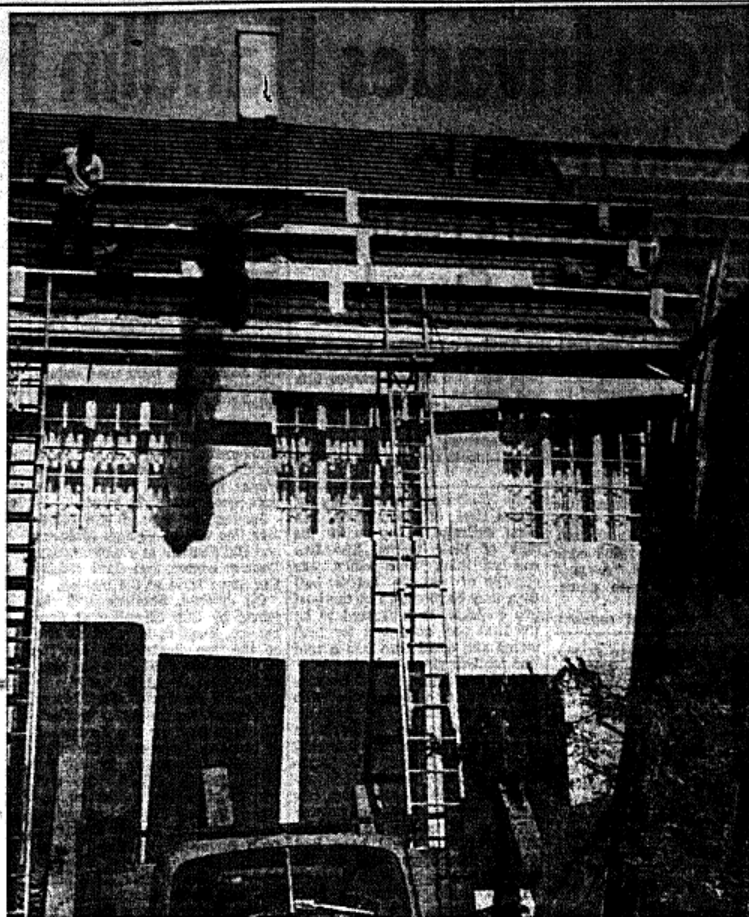

## Channel Change

PEORIA — With the aid of a new antenna, WEEK-TV will soon switch from Channel 43 to Channel 25, broadcasting a one-million watt signal over a greater area of central Illinois. The RCA "slotted-cylinder" antenna, the first of its kind, was unloaded Sept. 29, and placed in a cradle for extensive testing procedures.

The 120 foot-long, 12 ton pipe-like monster cost more than \$110,000 and took some five months to build. The channel change is scheduled to take place between Oct. 12 and 15.

## N.Y. Stock Trend Turns Irregular

NEW YORK (U) — Motors weakened in an irregular stock market early this afternoon. Trading was moderately active. As the strike against General Motors entered its second week there were signs that its impact was being felt in some communities.

All Big Three autos declined, with Chrysler especially weak and down more than a point.

Steels moved irregularly lower after showing a slightly higher trend at the start of trading.

Aerospace stocks, drugs, oils and selected blue chips in various groups made gains, but the

list as a whole was moving cautiously.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks at noon was up .1 at 325.5 with industrials up .2, rails up .1 and utilities unchanged.

The Dow Jones industrial average at noon was off .94 at 871.06.

## Seasonal Declines

WASHINGTON (U) — Employment and unemployment both showed expected, seasonal declines in September as approximately 1.7 million teenagers left jobs to return to school.

The unemployment rate for the month — 5.2 per cent — was slightly higher than August's 5.1 per cent but below the 5.5 per cent registered last September.

Employment stood at 70.8 million, compared with 72.1 in August and 69.5 million last September.

Unemployment was 3.3 million, down 350,000 from August, and down 200,000 from last September. It was the lowest September unemployment total since 1959.

## Rowdy Students in Berkeley Agreement

BERKELEY, Calif. — A three-day student uprising at the University of California ended Friday night with the school's promise that students will be provided a site near the campus for political activities.

Announcement of the settlement came as some 500 students and as many police thronged around a campus police car held captive by students for 3 1/2 hours.

Inside the car was Jack Weinberg, 24, a former graduate student taken into custody for raising funds for the Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), a civil rights organization.

Police allowed students to pass Weinberg sandwiches and soft drinks through a window of the police car.

The settlement between the administration and student representatives included a pledge that Weinberg would not be prosecuted for trespassing by the university as was threatened.

## Four in Reinders Family, Hartsburg Area Farmer, Die

A seven-member Lincoln family was tragically reduced to three in a head-on, two-car crash on Ill. No. 10 nine miles west of Lincoln at 7:55 p.m. Sunday.

Henry J. Reinders 37, of 245 Mayfair Drive; his wife, Joyce Elaine, 36; a daughter, Kathryn, 14; and a son, Eric, 1, all were killed outright when their car collided with one driven by Paul Johnson, 26, of rural route, Hartsburg. Johnson suffered a skull fracture, crushed larynx, and chest injuries and died at Abraham Lincoln Memorial Hospital at 9:10 p.m. Three other children in the Reinders family were taken to the hospital.

Two other sons, David, 13, admitted with a fracture of the left arm and multiple lacerations; and John, 6, suffering multiple lacerations and bruises are listed in fair condition by hospital authorities. A daughter, Debra, 10, is listed in critical condition from internal injuries.

The Reinders were en route home from Jacksonville after visiting Mrs. Reinders' mother, Mrs. Ralph Kehl. Authorities reported the station wagon carrying the Lincoln family of seven was attempting to pass another vehicle and crashed into the Johnson auto in the westbound lane.

The call reporting a fatal accident was relayed to county authorities by State Trooper George Garvey, at 8 p.m., and Sheriff Ken Zimmerman and Coroner John Barry went immediately to the scene. According to Zimmerman, ambulances from the Conrad Funeral Home of Mason City and Holland and Barry Funeral Home in Lincoln were called to take the injured and the dead to Lincoln.

When the sheriff arrived on the scene, four were already dead and four survived. Reinders' son and daughter killed in the smash-up had been thrown from the car as it was spun around following the impact.

### SPECULATE ON CAUSE

Witnesses were questioned as to the apparent cause for the collision, but no definite conclusion has been reached. The stretch of road on which the cars collided is straight. A slight dip and curve are to the east on the route from the point of impact.

Zimmerman indicated to a Courier reporter that further investigation will be conducted to determine cause of the tragedy. A survey of the road will be taken and studied. Assisting the sheriff at the scene were State Troopers Garvey, Robert Bowersock, Cpl. Samuel Jones, and special deputy William Crumpler. Coroner Barry will conduct an inquest into the multiple deaths.

### TOLL UP TO 19

The five deaths brings the toll killed in Logan County on highways thus far in 1964 to 19. Nine deaths of this total have occurred in the last 30 days.

Reinders was a district agent for Franklin Life Insurance Co. The family worshipped at Zion Lutheran church. ## Motel Asks Turndown On Rights

WASHINGTON (U) — The Heart of Atlanta Motel pleaded before the Supreme Court at the opening of the court's new term today for a decision striking down the public accommodations section of the new Civil Rights Act.

Moreton Rolleston Jr., Atlanta attorney and an official of the motel, said the fundamental question before the tribunal was whether Congress has the right to take from a private business concern the owner's choice of running his firm as he wishes and choosing his customers.

"The fact that Negroes are involved in this issue is purely incidental," Rolleston said. "If Congress has the power to take away the personal liberty of the individual businessman, there is no limit to the power of Congress."

The court, giving top priority to two test cases involving constitutionality of the 1964 civil rights law, got into involved questioning of Rolleston as to whether the commerce powers of Congress alone were involved in the cases.

Justice Hugo L. Black wanted to know if Rolleston thought the Supreme Court could decide the cases on any but the commerce clause of the Constitution. He noted that Congress specifically stated it was exercising its power under the commerce clause.

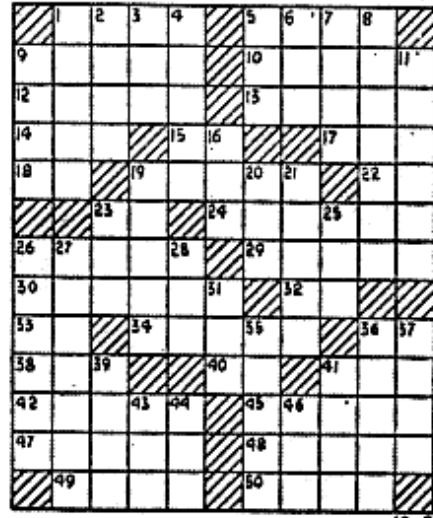

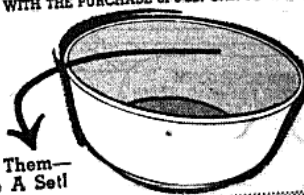

## Comedian Eddie Cantor's Funeral Tuesday Private

**HOLLYWOOD** — Eddie Cantor will be buried as he spent most of the last 11 years of his life — apart from the public that made him a top star during a golden era of American entertainment.

Groman Mortuary announced today that funeral services for the 72-year-old comedian, who died of a heart attack Saturday night, will be private.

Cantor was the last of a trio of great comedy figures to pass from the Hollywood scene in recent weeks. Grace Allen of the Burns and Allen team died Aug. 27, and Harpo Marx of the Marx Brothers succumbed two weeks ago.

### Daughters at Bedside

Cantor died at his Beverly Hills home. Two of his daughters, Mrs. Natalie Metzger and Mrs. Edna McHugh, were at his bedside. Two other daughters, Marilyn Cantor and Mrs. Janet Garl, live in New York. A fifth daughter, Marjorie, who had been the comedian's secretary, died of cancer May 17, 1933.

Cantor was born Edward Iskowitz in New York City Jan. 31, 1892. He came out of the slums with a vitality that captured audiences wherever he performed. A small man, he possessed enormous energy.

"If you knew Suzy," he chanted to the audience, tapping his palms together.

quainted with the high-pitched voice, the crisp gag line.

With his death, Cantor's great efforts for human causes were remembered. He raised staggering amounts for war bonds during the first and second World Wars, the Heart Fund, Bonds for Israel and other causes.

### Started as Amateur

Cantor's career spanned the years from amateur night in the Bowery to burlesque to vaudeville to the Ziegfeld Follies to movies, radio and television.

In 1953, when Cantor was establishing himself in the new medium of television, he suffered a heart attack. That brought an end to his career as an active performer.

In 1962, his wife, Ida, died of a heart ailment.

Friends say Cantor never recovered from grieving for his wife. He seldom left his home and was visited by only a few friends, including Jack Benny, Jerry Lewis and George Jessel.

## Goldwater Demanding TV Debate

TOPEKA, Kan. (U) — Sen. Barry Goldwater charged today that President Johnson is neglecting his duties for "full-time politicking" that "turns Sunday into campaign chaos."

The Republican presidential nominee referred to a campaign trip Sunday by Johnson that included a visit to a church in Phoenix, Ariz., Goldwater's hometown.

### "In Political Travesty"

Goldwater said the President had "visited church after church and city after city in a political travesty of the Lord's day."

After a quick flight here from Phoenix to open a new week of campaigning, the Arizona senator renewed his demands that Johnson agree to a televised debate.

"If the man who now occupies the White House wants to be more of a full-time President between now and election day, there is a way," Goldwater said.

### Avoid Chance of Error

The way, he said, is a nationally televised debate that "could be taped, so as to avoid the possibility of Mr. Johnson making a mistake that might jeopardize national security."

Goldwater added, "It could be done at a time and place of his choosing, so as to permit him to spend more time at his desk."

Topeka was the first stop in a new week of campaigning, followed by a visit to Des Moines and a night rally in Milwaukee.

### Baker Case Hurts LEJ

The senator, in a televised interview Monday night, said he felt the "Bobby Baker case" was hurting the President more than anything else and that the Republican ticket was beginning to draw more support from the voters.

"Our polls that we saw Sunday show us now over the 40 per cent mark in almost every state," he said.

Baker, former secretary to the Senate's Democratic majority, once was a Johnson protege. He resigned last year when his wide-ranging financial activities were revealed.

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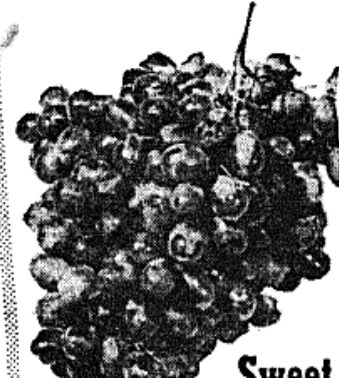

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## World's Fair 'Shuts Down'

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York World's fair has gone into hibernation for six months.

The billion-dollar exposition closed at midnight Sunday after a six-month run.

Fair officials said it was a financial success although it failed to live up to attendance and revenue projections made before its opening last April 22.

Fair records showed a total of 33,373,446 persons visited the fair during the first season — considerably short of the estimated 40 million forecast last March.

A total of 200,076 visitors passed through the turnstiles Sunday for the final public glimpse of the exposition until it reopens April 21.

Although no records were available immediately, Fair officials estimated the exposition would net some \$23 million less over its two-season run instead of the \$53 million originally anticipated.

## Europe Sees Illinois Items

LONDON, England — An Illinois farm store, first of its kind, has been opened in London's Europa Hotel. The "store" displayed Illinois farm products brought to London by the Illinois Farm Bureau Trade Development Mission.

Sixty-three men and women are taking part in the trade mission which left Chicago Oct. 12 and will return there Nov. 2. The mission will visit eight European countries looking for new markets for Illinois agricultural and food products. The mission is being led by William J. Kuhfuss, president of the Illinois Agricultural association.

Apples, dried milk, canned chicken, and popcorn caught the fancy of British importers who came to look, talk, and explore possibilities of buying from the Illinois food producers.

One British trade representative, a manufacturer of cake mixes, expressed an interest in Illinois soft wheat flour. He is also a general foods importer and expressed interest in canned foods. Another, a distributor of foods to specialty shops, discussed purchases of canned vegetables.

The only hitch of the opening day of the operation came when one buyer wanted to sample some of the canned chicken being shown by the 'Dennis Chicken Products company of Augusta. Finding a can opener, or a "tin" opener, as the Britishers call it, turned out to be somewhat of a problem.

But the real crisis came when hotel chefs were asked to pop popcorn. The British are familiar with caramel corn but not with popcorn. After a few lessons, they were able to provide corn popping service.

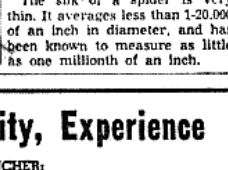

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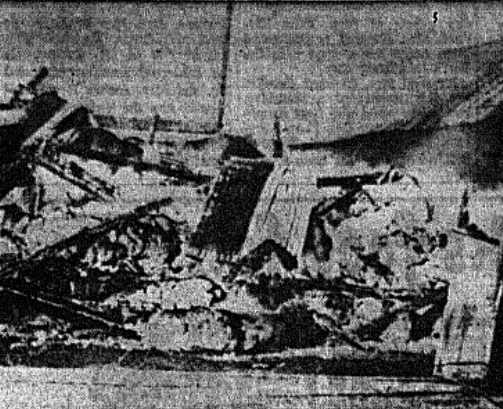

There is no other word for it."

Although "spooky" accurately describes the telepathetic qualities evident in Gold and Fizdale the word most assuredly bears no relationship to the gentlemen's down-to-earth personalities. Gregarious, articulate, literate and witty, "charming" is probably a much more appropriate adjective for the modest pair who are widely regarded as the pre-eminent duo-pianists of the world today.

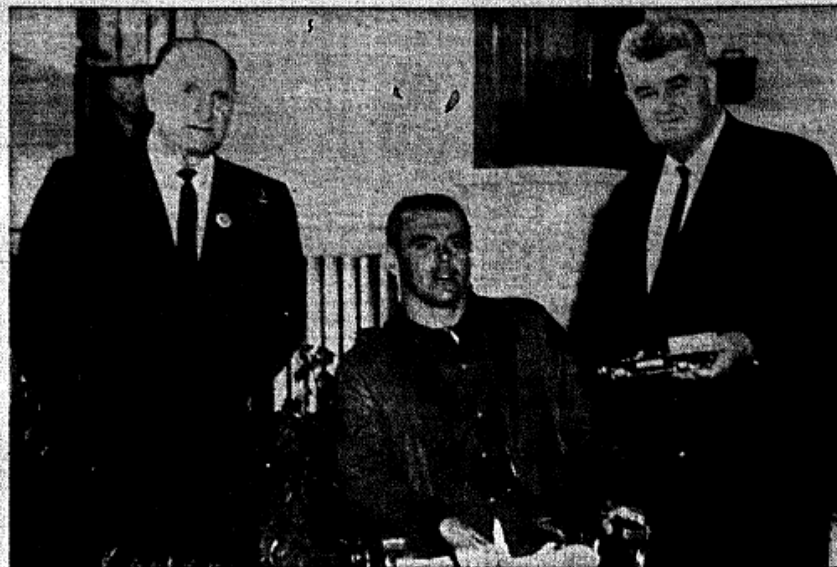
