# GOLDWATER ATTACKED

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The Executive Director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People attacked Republican presidential nominee Barry Goldwater Sunday for Goldwater's position on states' rights.

# Predict Illinois in Barry's Column

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — A 200,000-vote majority for the Goldwater-Miller ticket in Illinois has been predicted by two state Republican leaders. Statewide straw polls indicate the Republican national ticket is behind the Democratic national ticket.

Victor L. Smith of Fox, Republican state chairman Sunday the "silent" vote for Sen. Barry Goldwater, presidential candidate, running mate, Rep. William Miller, (R-M.I.).

U. S. Rep. Edward R. Roybal, chairman of Citizens for Goldwater, said the 200,000-vote margin was a "conservative" estimate. "I would not be surprised if the margin is even more winsome added," he said. "The last time we have shown a rebirth of alism for Barry Goldwater, Smith further predicted GOP will increase its share in Illinois Congressional election from 12 to 14. The d are now 12 and 11.

# Polls Point To LBJ Victory

**NEW YORK (AP)** — The polls are unanimous. They point to victory for President Johnson Tuesday.

But Sen. Barry Goldwater says he'll win.

"I know the polls don't agree with me, but they never have," he said Friday night.

A nationwide Associated Press survey of polls showed figures indicating Johnson's percentage of the popular vote might approximate the 20th century highs.

The 20th century record is Franklin D. Roosevelt's 60.8 per cent of the vote in 1936 against Republican Alf Landon. Republican Warren G. Harding got 60.4 per cent in 1920. Dwight D. Eisenhower got 57.4 per cent in 1956.

Here's a rundown on the latest national polls:

**Gallup Poll** — A semifinal poll by Dr. George Gallup gave Johnson 64 per cent, Goldwater 29 per cent and undecided 7 per cent.

**Louis Harris Poll** — Johnson 60

per cent, Goldwater 34 per cent, undecided 6 per cent.

**Popcorn Poll** — Johnson led 78-22 among purchasers of popcorn in movie theaters and supermarkets. They picked Harry S. Truman in 1948.

**Newsweek magazine** — A poll of 50 Washington correspondents showed 49 predicting a Johnson victory. Their consensus gave Johnson 454 electoral votes to 84 for Goldwater.

**Samuel Lubell** — His latest summary of nationwide findings: "Landslide victory for President Johnson."

In state and local polls reported by AP bureaus, Johnson's high margins were in New York and Iowa samplings.

The New York Daily News, which has been wrong on a presidential race only once — its first try in 1928 — gave Johnson 74.5 per cent of the New York State vote, an unprecedented showing.

In Iowa, Wallace's Farmer

poll, taken Oct. 22, gave Johnson 70 per cent, Goldwater 28 per cent, with 2 per cent undecided.

A random telephone poll by the Charlotte N. C. News on Oct. 19 showed Johnson 46 per cent, Goldwater 29, undecided 21, declined to state 4.

**California** — Mervin Field's latest poll, taken Oct. 23, showed Johnson 60 per cent, Goldwater 34, undecided 6.

**Illinois** — The Chicago Sun-Times poll gave Johnson 62.63 to Goldwater's 37.37 per cent.

**Ohio** — A poll by the Cleveland Plain Dealer showed Johnson with 60 per cent. The Akron Beacon Journal gave him 54 per cent, the Columbus Dispatch 55.8 per cent, and the Cincinnati Enquirer 52.2 per cent.

**Texas** — The Belden Poll in Johnson's home state, for the week ended Oct. 17, gave Johnson 61 per cent, Goldwater 34, undecided 5. Eliminating the undecided, it was Johnson 65-35.

which Logan voters will face include University of Illinois trustees (three to be elected), with candidates on both tickets.

Fourth district appellate court judge Republican candidates are Judges Samuel O. Smith, Stanley Thomas and Albert Salkie. One of the three Demo candidates is Atty. Harold F. Trapp of Lincoln, Republican candidate is Walter A. Yoder for circuit court (11th judicial district) while the Demos do not have candidates for the judgeship.

Separate ballots are plentiful for the Nov. 3 election. The biggest one is that an orange paper — bearing the names of 118 Republican and as many Democrat candidates — voters are permitted to designate a maximum of 177.

One hears an increasing indication on the part of voters to suggest they will vote a straight ticket on this more than three feet long ballot for at-large election of state representatives to the Illinois House. Most of the candidates are unknown to those who will be voting on them. And since there are time limits on how long one may spend in a voting booth, splitting one's ballot poses a problem.

#### ON GREEN BALLOT

Another separate ballot (green) will provide the voter opportunity to retain circuit court judges (11th judicial district) already on the bench. It gives opportunity to vote for retaining Circuit Judges Leonard Simkins of Mt. Pulaski and R. Burnell Phillips of Pontiac by making ballots with an X. There is no political party designation in this election in Logan, McLean, Livingston, Ford and Woodford counties. Separate blue ballots enable voting on where the Illinois legislature will meet yearly instead of every other year and enabling state government continuity in case of an emergency.

All of which adds up to one needing to be well prepared when he enters the voting booth on the long - awaited, much - heralded election day of 1964. There are 18,737 voters registered in Logan and while it is too much to expect all will go to the polls Tuesday, it is hoped a large majority of them will exercise their voting privilege.

# Veep Reactions to Tuesday's Election

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (U.P.) — Vice President-elect Hubert H. Humphrey flies to the side of President Johnson today, given an "overwhelming mandate" to stand "a heartbeat away from the presidency."

He leaves his home state with a parting jibe for Sen. Barry Tuesday night refusing to concede the election although Democrats were piling up a landslide.

Triumphantly addressing a weary but cheery audience in a hotel ballroom hours after midnight, Humphrey joshed:

"I think it's a victory, you know. I don't want to disturb anyone's sleep, but I think it is." Thus the Senate has lost its majority whip and the chief engineer of much of major legislation. Hubert Humphrey, 55 years a senator, moves to the head of the class with the constitutional authority to preside over it and vote in case of ties.

## CONTRIBUTES TO DEFEAT

LOCKPORT, N. C. (U.P.) — William E. Miller said lack of party unity contributed to the crushing defeat he and his Republican running mate, Barry Goldwater, suffered Tuesday.

He said the refusal of many state and local Republican candidates to support the national ticket tended to "weaken the Republican position from top to bottom."

However, Miller, the GOP vice-presidential nominee, said he would make no official statement on President Johnson's landslide election today until after word from Goldwater.

Miller said he talked by telephone with Goldwater Tuesday night, and they agreed not to comment until the GOP standard bearer had an opportunity to "analyze the vote."

An aide said Miller, a congressman who did not seek re-election to the House, would comment briefly and then fly to his home in Bethesda, Md.

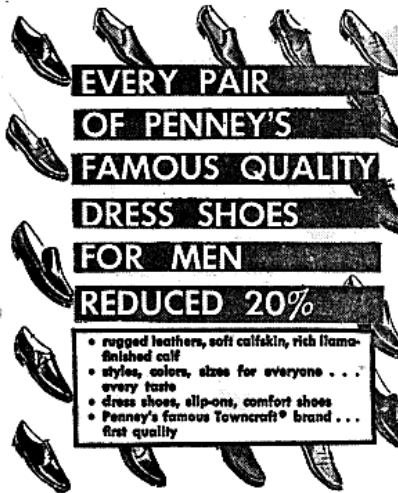

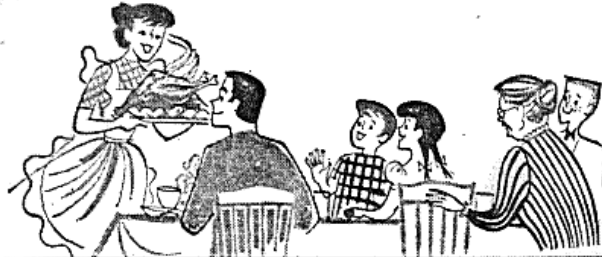

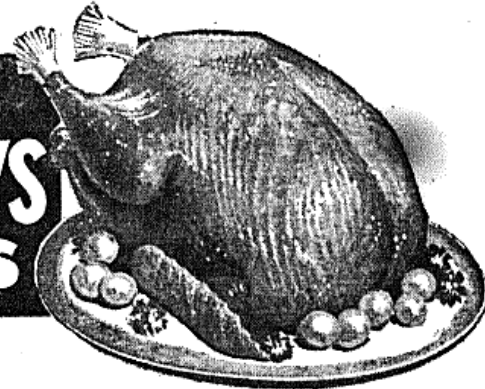
