The top vote-getter among Democrats was Adlai Stevenson III, son of the United Nations ambassador and former Illinois governor. Young Stevenson, making his political debut, got 2,361,623 votes.

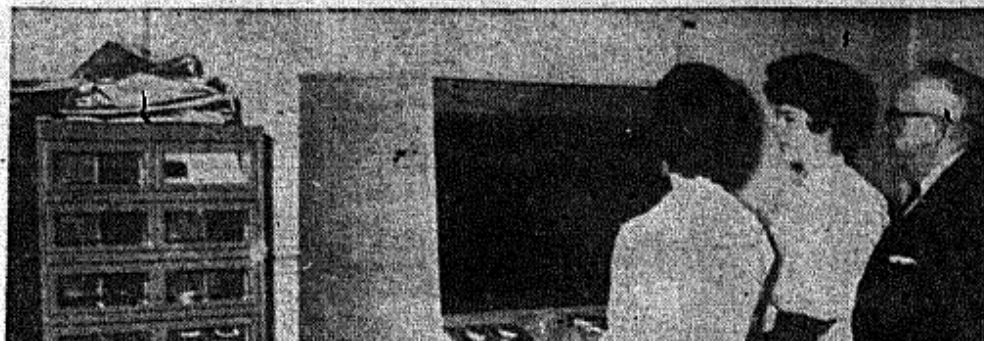

Gov. Tim Babcock applied the disaster - area designation to Powder River, Carter, Fallon, Prairie, Rosebud and Custer counties.

December records tumbled in Billings, Dillon, Great Falls, Livingston and Missoula. The temperature was -54 in the tiny community of Summit near the Glacier National Park. Great Falls had -34, Cut Bank -25, and Lewistown -26 Wednesday. Marysville, a mining camp northwest of Helena, reported -40. The -59 reading was taken at an Air Force weather station.

UTILITY SERVICE OFF
Sheer cold disrupted utility services. A temperature of -27 snapped a natural gas line which burst into flames south of Cody, Wyo., killing one man and severely burning another. Numerous homes were without heat as long as 5 hours.

The Pacific Northwest power system, with an unprecedented 6.2-million-kilowatt load, suffered many failures because of over-demand.

Snow plows and airplanes were utilized to reach isolated ranchers and cattle. An 88-year-old man died as he attempted to walk through snowdrifts from a stalled truck.

Washington State, experiencing one of its worst cold waves, shivered through record low temperatures. The coldest spot Wednesday night was -19 in Spokane, the lowest ever for December.

Three deaths were attributed to the Washington cold siege, including a 10-year-old boy who was killed when his sled hit a tree in the Seattle suburb of Bellevue.

Snow and cold struck Oregon, sending the temperature to -16 east of the Cascade mountains.

Cold-wave warnings were in effect for eastern New Mexico after cold air crossed into the state.

I took one in the shoulder and went down. Someone fell across my legs. I fell face down, my hand on Dave's back. He had been hit in the chest. Then the German infantrymen began to fire into us."

"I couldn't believe it. I kept asking myself 'Why? Why?' Then I prayed. Dave was a Catholic like me and I tried to get him to pray but he just gasped."

TANKS ADD FIRE

Passing tanks added their fire "just like a bunch of kids with air rifles."

Then the Germans came into the field and clubbed, stabbed and shot the helpless captives on the ground.

Another bullet passed through O'Connell's hand. O'Grady died. Late that afternoon the light began to fade and a German soldier walked up and shot O'Connell in the head. The bullet went through the side of his face and lodge in his mouth. He spat it out.

Not until Jan. 13, 1945, when Americans recaptured the town did they find the evidence of one

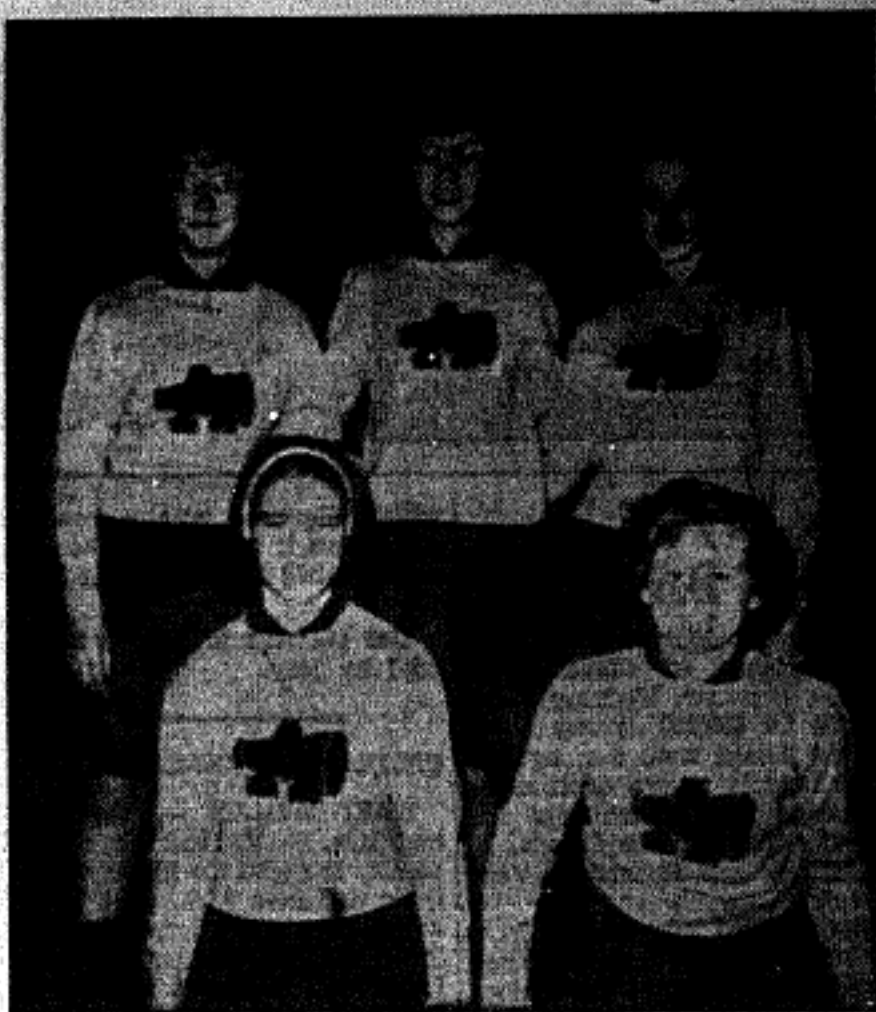

SLEET HITS MIDWEST

Mild weather sent the mercury to record high marks for Christmas in many Eastern and Southeast cities including 68 in Philadelphia, 62 in Burlington, Vt., and 83 in Shreveport, La. The 80 in New Orleans tied the all-time record high set in 1942.

Silence, Scurrying Rats Replace Playing Children

BERLIN (AP) — They stare back at you with dead eyes — the bricked-up windows of the high apartment houses. Behind their wooden doors there is silence, only rats scurry over the floors where once children played.

Beneath the windows on the sidewalk are small wooden crosses. Men and women fell or jumped to their death here to escape communism.

This is Bernauerstrasse — 1.2 miles long in West Berlin. It's the saddest street in the world. The roadway and both sidewalks of Bernauerstrasse are in West Berlin. But the buildings on the street's east side mark the border of the Communist world.

Stop Mass Escape
Neighbors, friends and relatives were torn apart when the Reds started in August 1961 to build the Berlin wall to stop the mass escape of refugees.

The Communists began with bricking up the doorways and the ground-floor apartment windows. It dawned on the people in the

houses on Eastern side that Communists were building a wall prison. They began to escape.

The first fugitives leaped out of the ground windows. They tossed their precious belongings into the street, then jumped or crawled to freedom.

Brick Up Upper Windows
The East German regime further steps, bricking up windows of the upper floors. Still people escaped. Men, women and children, young and old, slid down ropes and jumped the nets of firemen. Some made it safely.

Finally all the windows were sealed off and Red guards barred wire along the roofline. The Communists evacuated the houses, moving the remaining 2,000 residents to other parts of East Berlin.

Since then hair-raising escapes through tunnels and battles have kept Bernauerstrasse on front pages. It became a major tourist attraction.

LEVITTOWN, Pa. (AP) — They were tiptoeing around at about 6 a.m., and started opening presents in the playroom at about 7. Liz Schaefer, 25, said Friday of her seven orphaned nieces.

Christmas has been a joyous time for the seven Schaefer sisters because of the efforts of Aunt Liz and the children's grandmother, Kate Schaefer, 67.

The mother of the girls died giving birth to Georgeanne, in March 1961. Their father died in an auto accident three months later.

"It was a hectic day," a tired Aunt Liz said in an interview Friday.

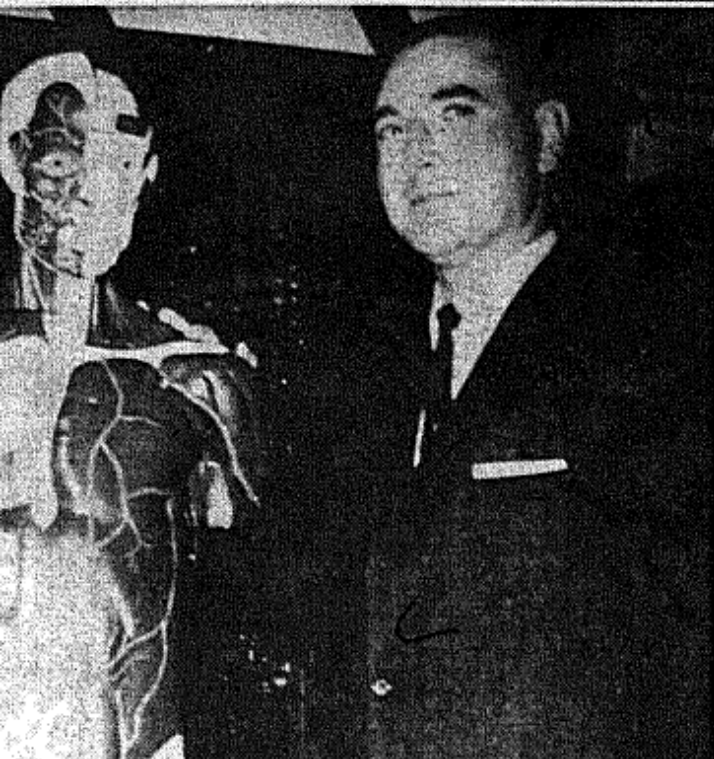
